Interview with Yvonne Ingram

1. Tell us something of your place of birth, your childhood, and your early adult life.

I was born in Jamaica in the 1940's. We were a Christian home and attended a Baptist church. I was baptized at 11 or 12 years old.

After I had finished high school, I worked at the post office and then for 3 months as a stewardess on a cruise ship. Then I was accepted into a teachers' college and as an airline hostess on Air Jamaica, but I chose to travel instead.

2. Have you been back to Jamaica? What about it do you miss the most?

Yes I have been back but not for long: I attended a wedding and went back to take my mother's ashes home and attend her memorial service.



I miss the fresh fruit and vegetables but not the weather: it's too hot.

3. Tell us about your family.

My mother was a jack-of-all-trades: she was a seamstress, a tailor, a shoemaker, a handicrafter, and a Social Welfare Officer for the Jamaican government. My father was a farmer, a watch repairer, and a mechanic. In later life he worked at a sugar refinery as an excise guard.

My parents had three children of their own but raised 17 in total. This included relatives and strangers. At times there were 4 or 6 children besides the three of us in the home. Some were students who boarded with us while they went to high school. In some cases parents couldn't afford to raise their children. We could manage.

Your parents must have been incredibly kind people

My parents' philosophy was: if you had one loaf of bread, you could share it with other people. We had a garden, which helped, so we could manage. People had small gardens and would readily swap produce with neighbours. They shared whatever they had. My mother was inventive and resourceful; her sewing helped.

4. What brought you to Canada and Regina?

I lived in the Jamaican Islands as a young adult. As it was with many of our young people, I dreamed of traveling abroad. My opportunity came in 1969 when a tourist couple heard about my wishes and sponsored me to come to Canada. I stayed with them for a year and worked in their house. They had three nursing homes, and I later worked in their office.

In 1973 I married. In five years' time we moved to Regina.

5. What was your profession and how and where did you prepare for it?

While living in Ontario, I took Accounting I and II and worked in an office. I enjoyed the work, particularly meeting people and talking to them on the telephone.

6. Where in Regina did you work?

When I came here in 1974, I took a job at the Toronto Dominion Bank as a personal accountant. Then my husband and I started an electronics business, and I worked in the office. In 1980 I started working at the Bureau of Statistics with the provincial government.

7. What brought you to our church? What about it do you most appreciate? Is there something you would like to see changed?

As I stated before, I have been a Baptist from birth. One Sunday, when my husband and I were staying at the Hotel Saskatchewan, we met Orris and Marjorie Keehr at lunch. I asked them about a Baptist church and you can guess the answer.

I love the friendliness at this church and the feeling of being a family. I love the Bible preaching and of course the music, particularly the choir.

8. Have you held a position in the church?

I am on a list to help with funeral lunches and on another list to serve at communion services.

9. I believe you are presently retired. What do you miss about your career days?

I miss talking to people on the phone and helping them with their research.

10. How you do now fill your days?

I like to read and also like to spend my days with my family: I have four sons and love to have my seven grandchildren spend time with me. I also have two great grandchildren. I cook special Caribbean food for them. Sometimes we do some craft together, we read, or go to a movie, or a to a park.

I hope they know how blessed they are to have you as their grandmother. Thank you for sharing your interesting life with us.

Diaconate Report

There is general consensus on the Diaconate that we need to pursue some additional staffing, or we risk burning out our pastoral staff. A vision for FBC direction is also slowly developing, but again resources to implement it will depend on more volunteers and additional staff. A lot of thought has gone into what we need as a church in terms of a staffing skill set and what we can afford. The Diaconate worked in May on developing Expressions-of-Interests (EOIs). Let me briefly explain the diaconate's thinking behind this approach. Currently, there are a lot of openings for ministerial staff that aren't being filled across the prairies, some in small towns, but many in the larger centers. An EOI we hope will let us explore the market place for any potential candidates without promising job positions, and perhaps draw the attention of potential candidates. All of this is to say, our direction may well be dictated by God's leading of the right people to our congregation. Please pray that we receive some excellent applications. We also intend to do a lot of networking with seminaries, Bible schools, and universities. Personal contacts could also be fruitful in creating awareness of opportunities, and in

encouraging qualified candidates to consider us. The EOs include offering a music internship for the organ (with a general music component and a ministry component), which will help us capitalize on our music strengths. By offering Full-Time (FT) and Part-Time (PT) options, we hope to attract even more candidates. While we hope for quick responses, and some developments, we have been warned that finding staff may take a year or more. Should the EOs not attract the quality staff we are looking for, one option would be to continue posting regular job openings. We are in discussion to renew our contract with Chris Senger. On June 17th we will hold a question and answer time regarding future staffing following the morning service in the sanctuary open to everyone. The following EOs were developed, and will hopefully be released by the time this newsletter is distributed:

1. One-Year FT or PT Music Ministry/Pipe Organ Internship
2. Associate Pastor FT
3. Pastor of Discipleship PT
4. Pastor of Young Adults PT or FT
5. Children's Pastor - PT or FT

Financial Report

Our operating income was 7% below the prorated budget to the end of April, while our expenses were under budget by 16%. Continued good management of our spending will help relieve pressure on our finances through the summer months. Each month will have unique expenses that will cause deviations from the projected budgeted expenses, but this should average out over time.

The Restricted Reserve funds balance decreased slightly due to some expenses on the organ. We continue to allocate the payment of the contract for our organist from the Organ Fund.

Approved Operating Budget to end of April 2018: \$129,296 (prorated monthly)

Operating Revenue to end of April 2018:	\$ 119,818
Operating Expenses to end of April 2018:	\$ 108,604
Restricted Reserve Balance:	\$ 182,120
CBWC Loan Balance:	\$ 282,409

Also, be reminded that our church has an option for regular donations and tithing through a Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR) function. Using PAR, your offering ensures regular monthly givings to help our church's ministry even when you are away. You will be providing a dependable flow of contributions, which increases the church's overall financial stability. If you are interested in "PAR-ticipating" let us know and someone from our Finance Committee will be in touch with you.


ChurchTrac

Our Church management software (ChMS) called ChurchTrac has been implemented over the past month to streamline common administrative tasks, track and manage resources, foster communication, and monitor growth of the congregation. The first efforts have been toward replacement of our teller database and membership directory, both of which are now being utilized on the new system.

There is a Congregation Access feature which allows members of our church to access their own profiles. Members can access their own contribution statements, member lists, and picture directories, and update their personal and family profile. Only those names that have been entered in the database **with an email address** will be able to access and use the Congregation Access feature. In order to view your personal profile, please use the following link:

When a person initially visits the Congregation Access link, they will be asked:

1. to provide their email address and access code. The member must enter their email address, and that address must match the email address which we have in the database.
2. You will then need to click on the link: “I do not know my Passcode, or I do not have a Passcode”
3. You will be sent a secure access code at that email address to complete the log-in process.
4. After you log in, you can change this access code to one that you can remember by clicking the “gear” link – 

Please note that it is very important that we are provided with current email addresses in order to utilize some of the more useful benefits of the system.
