One paragraph after another begins, "and…, and then…, and then immediately…" and so on, to Jesus' final days in Jerusalem. And then, Mark famously leads listeners off a cliff. (In what is considered to be the original ending by Bible scholars, the book



of Mark ends at chapter 16, verse 8.) What really happened? What do you believe?

Imagine yourself inside the story. Step into the street and walk toward Jesus. What would you ask him? What would you ask of him? What is he doing? What are the



people around him doing and saying? Perhaps during your prayers, you might read one passage from Mark a few times over while imagining yourself in the story.

I also encourage you to sit down and read this book straight through. It will take an hour or two, but doing this will heighten the dramatic moments. Do write me and let me know what jumps out.

May your contemplation of Jesus, the strong one, bring you courage and peace.

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

Celebrating 2021 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in Canada

Every year, Christians around the world are invited to celebrate a Week of Prayer for the unity of all Christians, to reflect on scripture together, to participate in jointlyorganized ecumenical services, and to share fellowship.

The theme for Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2021 is "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit" (John 15:5-9). This theme is developed through a series of reflections which extend over eight days and will be the basis of the Bible study. Each day will be led by a different denominational leader.

The international resources for 2021 Week of Prayer for Christian Unity have been prepared by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp in Switzerland, a group of religious sisters from different church traditions brought together by a common vocation of prayer, community life and hospitality, and by their commitment to Christian unity.

Daily Bible Studies are being led by and for the churches of Regina. *First Baptist is leading Tuesday's Bible study*. The Zoom link will be provided closer to the event.

Day 1 – Monday, January 18th: Called by God: "You did not choose me but I chose you" (John 15:16a)

Day 2 – Tuesday, January 19th: Maturing Internally: "Abide in me as I abide in you" (John 15:4)

Day 3 – Wednesday, January 20th: Forming One Body: "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12b)

Day 4 – Thursday, January 21st: Praying Together: "I do not call you servants any longer...but I have called you friends" (John 15:15)

Day 5 – Friday, January 22nd: Letting Oneself Be Transformed by the Word: "You have already been pruned by the word..." (John 15:3)

Day 6 – Saturday, January 23rd: Welcoming Others: "Go and bear fruit, fruit that will last" (John 15:16b)

Day 7 – Sunday, January 24th: Growing in Unity: "I am the vine, you are the branches" (John 15:5a)

Day 8 – Monday, January 25th: Reconciling with all Creation: "So that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete" (John 15:11)

Searching for Jesus: The Journey of the Magi

Pastor Joel's sermon from Sunday, January 3, 2021 (A summary)

Scripture: Matthew 2:1-12; Isaiah 60

The journey of the Magi was a search for Jesus which ended with joy – indeed, joyfulness with very great joy.

The story of the Magi is memorable. The Magi are mysterious characters. We don't know who they were or where they came from – only that they came from the east. We're not sure what happened to them afterwards.

The story also has fantastic events: the Magi being led by a star (whatever that means), and being warned, by God, in a dream.

The story is memorable for these reasons and yet for these very reasons it's easy to dismiss. It is tempting to decide the story is made up or is just a myth. We should not underestimate the importance of the Magi. The Magi are one of the most common symbols we have found in early churches and in catacombs.

Matthew opens with the Magi – from the Gentile nations – coming to worship Jesus. As we heard last week, Matthew next retells the story of Jesus being sent to live in Egypt. Matthew closes with this commandment to the disciples, "Go, therefore, to all the nations."

Matthew emphasizes that Jesus' birth was revealed to other nations as well as Israel, just as the prophets had said he would be. Paul put it this way: Salvation comes from the Jews but by God's grace, all nations are welcomed equally into God's salvation.

Salvation for the nations is not merely a standing invitation. God sent Jesus to Egypt. God called the Magi to come to Jesus, and he led them there. God was actively seeking out the nations. This is what we celebrate at Epiphany: The revelation of Jesus, not just to his own people, but to all the nations, so that, together with the Jews, we might be made into a new family, a new people of God.

The Magi are also a symbol of endurance for us. How long did the Magi search for Jesus? How long would you search for something before giving up? How long before despair or frustration would take over?

We have been enduring Covid-19 and the related restrictions for nine months now. It is taking a toll on us, on our city, and on our world. It is taking a toll on mental health, marriages, businesses, and front line workers.

I can't help but take this experience of hardship and think back to World War I and II. Year after year, people had to endure and persevere in taking care of each other, and making the best of life. Daily, they would hear reports of deaths and destruction. There was no end to the rationing of food and all supplies. Yet, the wars did end. Good *can* come out of the hardship we are experiencing at the moment. We have already seen signs of some of that as we search for the end of the virus. Let us be faithful to one another and to God; we can do this.

How long did the Magi search? Was it more than nine months?

Few Christians go through life without experiencing at least one time, if not many times, when it seems like God is absent. Sometimes church, prayer, and Bible reading feel like an empty routine with nothing there. Or sometimes God does not answer a concern or burden in life, after many years of prayer.

How long did the Magi search for Jesus? From Matthew 2:16, we can guess that it was upwards of two years, according to the time that Herod had learned from the Magi when the star first appeared.

We don't know what hardships or obstacles they endured in their travels from outside of the Roman Empire. We don't know if they ever questioned whether they had been mistaken, or if they would ever reach their goal.

Some parts of their journey were clear. They had guidance from God through a star, a dream, and the clear words of the prophets. We know there was also uncertainty, ambiguity, and perhaps the silence of God. Their very first appearance in the story, their very first words, are a question, "Where is he?" They had come all this way and yet they still did not know where they were going or where to look next. Then they were sent off with these words: "Go and search for him." These were not clear directions.

Rather, these are words that could be applied in our lives, or in anyone's life, about Jesus: "Go and search for him."

I wonder about their discovery itself – just how unmistakable could it have been? What did they find in the end? Just a child with his parents. How clear was it that this was the king they had been looking for?

Did they ever question their experience later? Did they ever wonder if they had been wrong? Did anyone else ever believe them? All of the events in their story, when you put them together, make for compelling evidence that this child was the Messiah, the one that they were looking for.

But none of it was repeatable. There wasn't anything they could show anyone else to prove what they had found. All they had was their own testimony – which is just like it is for us.

I know for myself, what I have experienced in life has led me to Jesus and to joyfulness with very great joy. But I can't prove it. I can't even guarantee to other people that if they just do this, or take these steps, they will meet Jesus in the way that I have.

It seems like God requires of all of us that we make this journey on our own. There is hardship. Sometimes it seems to take longer. Sometimes there are clear signs, but other times, we are lost.

Always, in the end, when we meet Jesus, it is marked by joy.

We are on a journey ourselves. Many of us are carrying grief and are enduring hardship. All of us are enduring through this season of Covid.

Some are searching for Jesus and maybe it seems like he is not there, that the signs are not clear. But Jesus *is* there and God *is* leading.

Meeting Jesus in this life is a hint of the joy that we will experience one day when we meet Jesus face to face. All the sorrow and grief and hardship will be caught up together with joy – the joyfulness of very great joy that we will have when we see Jesus for ourselves.
