## **Spiritual Disciplines Series: Teaching/Preaching**

The call to teach or preach is a biblical calling and one which leads to not only greater knowledge of God, but also calls into being all of the sections of spiritual formation: reasoning, reflecting, relating and restoring. Teaching, as understood biblically, is not just a job for pastors or educators, but for all of us. In Proverbs, we read of the teaching of parents to a child: "Hear, my son, your father's instruction and do not forsake your mother's teaching; indeed, they are a graceful wreath to your head and ornaments about your neck" (Proverbs 1:8-9). We may not think of our interactions with others as times of teaching, but whether our children or neighbours, our conversation with others can be, and often are, opportunities for teaching.

In Matthew 5:19 we find these powerful words of Jesus: "Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven." There is a warning here to those who teach, to not only teach what is right, but to practice what they teach (or preach). As we go about our day-to-day activities, even when not speaking (being silent), our actions speak for us. So, whether in word or deed, we ought to be representing the gospel in our lives.

In Paul's second letter to Timothy, we find these challenging yet encouraging words: "In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: Proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching." (2 Timothy 4:1-2). The goal of such teaching is the formation (transformation) of others.

One of the paradigms I use for ministry (correlating with the words reason, reflect, relate, and restore) has education as its' base. In ministry we are called to educate, exalt, encourage, and evangelize. It unpacks as follows:

Educate - Psalm 1; Matthew 28:18-20; 2 Timothy 3:16

One of the great tasks the church has been given, is to educate people about the transformative love of God in Christ. One of our greatest tools to use in this education, is the Bible!

**Exalt** – Deuteronomy 6:4-5; Psalm 34:1-3; Psalm 63:1-4; Romans 12:1

The Bible, however, is not a book merely to be learned in an academic sense — it is a book to be applied to one's life. The first and greatest application comes in the response to "love God with all of our heart, mind, strength and soul."

Encourage – Leviticus 19:18; John 13:34-35; 1 John 4:7-21

Our second response to the transformative love of God in Christ is to "love one another." It is in loving one another that we display our knowledge of God in human relationship.

**Evangelize** – Exodus 19:6; Mark 16:15-16; Acts 1:8

It is in understanding the fact that we are loved by God (education) – even though we did nothing to warrant such love – and responding to such love by loving God (exaltation), and loving one another (encouragement), that we become witnesses (evangelism) to the transformative love of God in Christ.

May our Lord teach us and guide us in this lifestyle of teaching/preaching!

### New Renovaré Online Course

Loneliness and Hope: Living with Longing

## The Beginning of the Good News

Pastor Joel's sermon from Sunday, January 10, 2021 (A summary)

Scripture: Mark 1:1-11

If we think in terms of cause and effect, "the beginning" can be the first of a series of events, like the first domino that falls and sends all the others cascading forward. We also have "the beginning" of a river, that is to say, its source.

Imagine following the Nile River where it flows into the Mediterranean Sea, through to Lake Victoria, and from there along the Kagera River, to its source in Rwanda and Burundi.

Imagine everything you would see if you travelled the entire 7000 kilometres of the Nile. At the Nile delta in the Mediterranean, sediment pours into the sea and an abundance of microorganisms flourish. This allows a manifold ecosystem of animals and plants to thrive. Up through the delta, the mix of brackish and fresh water encourages a whole new diversity of life.

As you move inland, you would pass villages, towns, and large cities, established because the Nile provides the water for drinking, cleaning, fishing, hunting, energy, industry, and transportation. You would see farms sustained by the rich soil from flooding, sediment, and irrigation.

As you continue to travel, you would see animals in the river, wading, flying above it, and swimming, coming to bathe, eat, and drink. You would see forests and grasslands spreading out.

You can follow the Nile through eight nations, seeing all of this diversity and abundance of life. If you kept following it back to the springs in Rwanda and Burundi, you would arrive at the source of all of this life, and you would say, "This is the beginning of all that I've seen. This is its source."

What is the source, what is the beginning of the Gospel? Of the good news?

Mark's gospel starts with a roar, like we hear in verse 3, "The voice of one crying in the wildernesss." Mark's first words are an exclamation: "The beginning of the good news for humanity and for all of creation is Jesus the Anointed One, the Son of God!"

"Prepare the way! And make straights the paths for him."

You might think that this road was to help us travel to that beginning, to Jesus, like 19th century explorers, searching through remote and wild places, back to the Nile's source.

But that's not it at all.

We prepare this road so that the source of all life, so that the ruler of all things, can come to us. We are preparing the way for God, who will descend to us. John the Baptist calls to us, "Prepare!" because "the glory of the Lord shall be revealed and all flesh will see it together." (Isaiah 40:3-53)

John tells us to prepare, to repent and to be baptized, because "Someone Powerful" is coming. I'm just using plain old, everyday water to baptize you but the powerful one who is coming, is going to baptize you with the Holy Spirit. (See Mark 1:7-8)

Someone powerful is coming. And it happened: "In those days, Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John." (1:9)

As Jesus appears, I wonder how you imagine him? Often, the picture I get is of a serene man, a very calm and composed man, almost floating through life.

In Mark's Gospel, Jesus is anything but that: he's active, powerful, forceful, strong, firm, courageous. This is evident right away. As Jesus ascended from the waters, Mark says, "the heavens were torn open and the Spirit descended." (1:10)

This kind of opening is like a father who hears their child in trouble on the other side of a locked door. The father isn't patiently knocking and calmly opening the door – no! The father bursts the door open to save his child.

Here the heavens are torn open, like the temple curtain was torn when our Lord was crucified, and like the graves were burst open when our Lord died. The heavens were torn open and the Spirit descended to earth.

From this beginning, Mark is like a fast moving river. Jesus is always on the move.

Mark also gives us a straightforward outline of his story in verse one. Mark gives Jesus two royal titles as a way of claiming that God's authority, the rule of God, the rule of heaven, the kingdom had come to earth in Jesus.

Mark calls Jesus "Christ" and "Son of God."

"Christ" is a Greek word which, in Hebrew, is "Messiah". In English, both these words mean "Anointed One." "Anointed One" (or Christ) and "Son of God" are titles for Hebrew kings, going back to King David.

Mark's gospel divides neatly into two parts following those two titles. From the source, from this beginning, we move very quickly with Jesus as he heals and teaches, as he performs exorcisms, as he commands nature, and feeds multitudes. From chapters 1 to 9, everything take place in and around Galilee.

All of that action culminates in chapters 8 and 9, when Peter exclaims, "You are the Anointed One! You are the Christ, the Messiah, God's chosen ruler on earth." Immediately, Jesus ascends the Mount of transfiguration and reveals his glory to his disciples.

When they come down from the mountain, Jesus then turns to Jerusalem. From chapters 9 to 15, Jesus intentionally walks to his death. Jesus is crowned and "enthroned" in Jerusalem in a way that, to this day, we struggle to make sense of: on a cross. But this is how God's authority on earth comes about.

As Jesus is enthroned on the cross, at the climax of the entire story, the gentile centurion exclaims, "Truly this was the Son of God!" (15:39)

The source of the good news for creation is God's authority come to earth in Jesus Christ. This is where Mark begins. The King is coming! Get ready!

And it happened.
