### Prayer Breakfast



So if one gives approximately 2/3 of one's taxable income to charities, it can work out that one doesn't have to pay any income tax at all! Seriously though, big or small, every contribution to KLC is much appreciated and helps our camp flourish.

The 2019 year-to-date financials indicate that offerings to the end of March were 2% above giving for the same period in 2018 Although total operating expenses to the end of March were 11% below our balanced budget of \$102.2K, we are still in a deficit position for the first quarter of the year.



### Interview: Kayely Rich



# Kayely, can you tell us how you first became involved with the Baptist church?

I have been part of the Canadian Baptist family my whole life. My dad has been a pastor (and academic) since I was born. My younger brother and I grew up between Alberta and BC. My mom ran a home daycare then later returned to school to become a

teacher. You can certainly say that ministry, children and ongoing learning have been key parts of my life modelled from an early age.

# Were there other milestones in your early life that pointed you to full-time Christian ministry?

I don't remember much about coming to faith since I embraced Jesus when I was very young. I do remember, though, opportunities along the way to lean into and honour that commitment. I especially remember feeling a call to ministry when I was 12 years. We were attending a youth conference and the speaker invited anyone present who was feeling called to ministry to come to the front for prayer. It was though I couldn't stay in my seat. Although I didn't know what this call would mean or how it would manifest itself, it was a vivid moment that has since been confirmed in a variety of ways.

### What did you do after you graduated from high school?

After high school, I moved to Vancouver to attend UBC. I completed my Bachelors in Psychology with a minor in French before being asked to serve with CBM as a volunteer in Belgium. I spent 7 months in Liege, Belgium helping in 2 local churches and working on some translation of books for a new support group ministry. Translation work proved to be tougher than I had anticipated, but I still greatly enjoyed the opportunity to work alongside Christian brothers and sisters living in another culture and language.

# What an experience! (I'm a great believer in learning another language and travel abroad.) Did this experience influence your next steps?

When I came back to Canada, I began working on my masters degree. I knew that I wanted to train in counselling so I ended up moving to Southern Manitoba in the middle of winter so I could attend Providence Seminary. It was -50°C as I got off the airplane in Winnipeg wearing my winter gear from Vancouver. Needless to say, it took me a bit of time to get used to Prairie winters! But, like many others, I found a way, and am glad to say that I completed my Master of Arts in Counselling while also working my way through a Masters of Divinity. I made the choice not to stay longer to complete the MDiv as I had run out of funds at this point and didn't want to take out any loans.

### So I imagine that at this point you started to look for a job.

Yes. I began asking God to guide me to the ministry work He had for me. All I knew was that I was to start driving West. Long story short, I drove all the way to family in BC with numerous stops along the way, but in the process God opened the doors for me to come to Regina to work at Argyle Road Baptist Church as their Associate Pastor. I enjoyed getting to know the kind people of Regina and learned a lot in my first few years of pastoring.

# I understand that you then took a job with Arrow Leadership in Vancouver. Tell us about Arrow Leadership.

Arrow Leadership is a 2-year program designed to help active ministry leaders (pastors, para-church directors, etc) be led more by, lead more like and lead more to Jesus. This was a special opportunity for me as my grandparents had been serving many years as mentors for a number of the ministry leaders that went through Arrow's programs. My grandparents were gifted with a ministry of prayer that allowed them to speak deeply into people's lives. Hearing stories of their impact and having many long visits with my grandparents has helped shaped me and has given me a desire to work patiently and deeply with others.

### And after that you came back to Regina?

Although I wasn't sure quite what to expect when I returned to Regina following my time at Arrow Leadership, there really was much in store! I worked briefly in retail, got to know my now-husband, Gerald, and was able to focus more on counselling work at The Caring Place. After getting married, Gerald and I became foster parents and have been enjoyed having 6 extra children living with us while also raising 2 daughters of our own: Lizzy (4.5yrs) and Klara (2.5yrs).

When we do have some free time as a family, we enjoy travelling together - especially making trips to BC to visit my extended family. We're also known to frequently visit the library as a family and can be caught enjoying a good book or two at home.

I don't know how you manage to do as much as you do. I believe you have had quite a lot of involvement with the foster care ministry as well as caring for your own children. And still you have time for volunteer work with the CBWC. Tell us some more about the CBWC and your involvement with it.

In the midst of so many joys over the last 6 years since marrying Gerald, I have been especially humbled to give back to the Canadian Baptists of Western Canada (CBWC) by serving on their board of directors. We, at First Baptist, are connected to the CBWC as our denomination. (It was formally called the Baptist Union of Western Canada or BUWC). We are made up of Canadian Baptist Churches across BC, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Yukon and the Northwest Territories. I have personally been a part of our denomination since I was born and it is part of what has helped me feel connected to a larger family even as I moved across Western Canada throughout my life.

I spent my first 2 years on the CBWC board as a rep for the Heartland Region before serving another 2 years as Vice President of Personnel and Planning. This meant that while helping guide the organization of the 2017 Assembly, I was also leading the search committees to hire Rob Ogilvie, our new Executive Minister and Larry Schram, our new BC/Yukon Regional Minister. I have now spent the last 2 years serving as the Board President, chairing our meetings as well as sitting on the boards for Carey (our seminary), CBM (our mission agency), CBWC Foundation Shareholders (our financial foundation) and Shareholders Seed (an ministry Mustard Alberta homeless/poor). This experience has helped me better get to know some wonderful people across our denomination and has given me a glimpse of the many ways God is at work in Western Canada! Please

pray for us especially as I prepare to chair the business meetings for the CBWC at our Assembly in High River May 22-25.

Kayely, you bring so much to your position on our staff. I know Joel is already appreciating your strong administrative skills, and loves having you around in so many ways. Welcome!


