JuBELLation Ringers



Learning for Life

"The Book of Ezekiel" - ends December 8, 2019

Dr. Kelvin Friebel is leading a class on the book of Exekiel. This class began with information on how to read Old Testament prophecy, followed by an introduction to the book of Exekiel. The remainder of the classes will break down different key chapters in Ezekiel, including:

- Ezekiel's call to be a prophet
- Ezekiel's weird behavior
- Israel the unfaithful wife
- God and foreign nations
- God restoring his presence

Dr. Friebel's doctoral studies are in Hebrew and Semitic studies, and he has a long history of teaching the Old Testament at CTS, Houghton College, and more recently, at Briercrest College and Seminary.

"Stories about Jesus" - ends October 27, 2019

This class will read some of the stories from Jesus' life, as told in the gospels, with the hope of getting to know Jesus better. The class will be especially appropriate for people just looking at the Christian faith and people young in their faith. It will also be suitable for young people ages 11-12 and up, as well as for adults. It will involve dramatic reading, perhaps some acting out of the stories as appropriate, and much discussion. This class will be followed in November by:

"Stories Jesus Told" - November 3 to December 8, 2019
This class will use the same format as "Stories about Jesus." Instead of stories featuring Jesus, we will look at some of his parables, stories he told to teach about the Kingdom of God.

Both classes will be taught by Ron Phillips.

KLC Treasurer's Report

This last month, I had the awesome fun of looking at old slides and pictures from KLC and digitizing them. One thing that struck me is that those early youthful campers are now in their 70s or 80s, and most of the leaders from those early years are gone. When I looked

at the early slides, it was clear that the campers were having fun: swimming, canoeing, playing games, chasing each other, and finding God. Many of them grew up, had children, took them to KLC, and supported KLC with their time and money. Then their children grew up and did the same. KLC has maintained itself throughout the past 70 years because each generation has taken time and effort to show the next generation the wonder of the place, and the wonder of the God who meets people there.

KLC had a strong summer selling out several of the summer camps, and we are well ahead of budget projections. However, our plan was to upgrade the property and equipment and pay down debt, and we have been running significant negative cash flows all summer doing so. Now it is time for us to rebuild our cash chest to prepare for next year. Summer camp fees only cover about one third of our total camp expenses, and if camp fees alone sustained the camp, we would have to charge more than \$1000 per camper per week to break even. Just another reason our fund-raising Gala is so important to us.



Finances

The 2019 year-to-date financials indicate that offerings to the end of August were 12% above giving for the same period in 2018. Our total operating expenses to the end of August were 7% below our balanced budget of \$272.5K, and are marginally below our revenue at this point in the year. Due to the increase in personnel expenses beginning in May, we are still forecasting that overall expenses will be close to the budgeted number at year-end.

We received another bequest designated for the Organ Fund which significantly increased the Restricted Reserve Balance. The Finance Committee is considering options for investing and use of these new funds.

NOTE: Our budget for 2019 was increased with the congregation's approval to hire new staff. Now that our new pastors have joined the staff, please consider this when you budget your monthly giving and tithes.

Nursery (ages 0-3)

We are excited to be working on an update to the nursery this fall. While work is being completed mid-week, the nursery will still be set up each Sunday so that children have a familiar place to come. Volunteers are in the nursery most Sundays to welcome your children 0-3 yrs and help them know this a place where they are cared for by our church family. Our time together includes a song, a story and play with others. While we know it is an adjustment for each wee one to leave their parents, please try leaving your cell number or location in the sanctuary with the nursery workers and see how your child settles.

On weeks where the older children are upstairs, the nursery will be unsupervised, so parents are welcome to stay in the nursery with their little ones and watch the service on the tv.

Godly Play (ages 3-6)

Godly Play is a method of Christian education and spiritual direction that aims to teach children the art of using religious language, parable, sacred story, silence and liturgical action to help them become more fully aware of the mystery of God's presence around them and in their lives. 
Oasis (ages 7-11)

Interview: Dell and Susan Bornowsky

Dell and Sue, you are fairly new to our church, and yet I feel I have known you for ages. As I have got to know you, I realize I know bits and pieces of your past, but have never heard you tell your stories from the beginning. So I welcome this opportunity.



I'll have to ask you this first question individually. Did you grow up in Regina?

Sue: No. I grew up in Calgary. My father was involved in various committees at First Baptist Church, Calgary, and my mother worked part time in the office. That was at the time when Howard Bentall was Senior Minister. When I was in High School some school friends lured me into the occult, and for about five years I was involved in that. But I didn't have any real friends.

Dell: I was born near Lesser Slave Lake, in northern Alberta, on a subsistence farm. My father was a Roman Catholic and so I was brought up to learn the catechism. I was told I had to know it, but nobody ever told me why I had to know it. My mother was an agnostic and encouraged me to ask questions. I figured that the priests were paid to believe all that; that was their schtick.

So where did you meet?

Dell: I came to SAIT in Calgary to take a course in Radio and TV. This was the time of the "hippies" and the "Jesus people" and I felt

comfortable among them. No one came and evangelized us. Young people became Christians just through talking to one another. I'm not sure how that happened.

I never did work in the field of broadcasting, my course at SAIT. There was an opportunity to do some construction work at Olds, so I went there and did a carpentry apprenticeship.

Sue: Meanwhile, a friend at FBC invited me to come to the Youth Group, during Harold Mitten's pastorate. The youth leaders presented 5 evidences of the resurrection that night. It all made sense to me immediately and I committed my life to Christ that very night.

Then I got hit by a bus, broke my hip and spent some time in hospital, and couldn't get involved in Youth Group activities. But the Youth Group was also involved in going out to rural Baptist churches. I got to know Dell at this time.

Dell: We knew each other for some years as good friends. We finally realized we were meant for each other. I took Sue out one evening to propose to her, not realizing that the path we were on ended up at the garbage dump. So I proposed to her at the dump.

Tell us something about what you did then.

Back in Olds we were involved in various different churches, not ever really fitting into any of them. Friends at Olds Baptist church encouraged me to attend a Bible school in Peace River. I suggested Sue join me. In the second semester she was able to attend the Bible school.

We got married in 1977 and built a house in Olds. Eli was born in 1980. At that time we were attending an independent Pentecostal

church, which was involved in prison ministry. I enjoyed visiting in the prison, often taking Eli along. The inmates loved seeing a baby. We also had inmates stay with us in our home when they were on parole. We also attended Catholic charismatic meetings and were involved in a number of different denominations.

Then First Baptist Calgary celebrated its centennial in 1988, and as a centennial project, renovated the building. I was invited back to head up that project. While we were there, I got involved in the Mustard Seed ministry, and started a Certificate in Ministry through Carey in its outreach program. I met Axel Schoeber (Kayley's father) who was directing that.

There followed some hard financial years. Carpentry opportunities collapsed. I wasn't able to complete the C. Min program —let alone move to Vancouver to do it on site.

At this point I believe you did some work in Japan?

Yes. I knew someone in Japan who was involved in building, so I went out there to help him for two three-month stints in 1996 and 1997. Sue had a cousin living in Japan, building houses for missionaries. One day we received a phone call out of the blue inviting us both to go to Japan for a year, helping in construction as well as in gospel ministry. Sue's cousin needed an immediate answer, and since we were wondering what to do, we called back at 6 a.m. the following day to say we would come.

We decided to sell our house in Olds and put it in the hands of an agent. We were just about to leave, and it hadn't sold. Then we got a call from the agent at 11:55 p.m. saying he had an offer, but it was only valid till midnight. We managed to get the papers signed in time. [Sue: this is how I learned that God always answers our prayers, but sometimes not until the last minute.]

When we came home, I decided to go to seminary. I started at Prairie Bible Seminary in 2003, and when they closed, transferred to Briercrest, where I completed an M.A. in Hebrew Scripture and an M.Div. After that we moved back to Calgary for a while. I had invitations for interviews from the Salvation Army in Victoria, the Alliance in Vancouver, the Mennonites in Saskatoon (who then rejected me because I was too philosophical), and the Japanese Baptist church in Edmonton! I did do interim pastoring at the Evangelical Missionary church in Sundre but apart from that none of these seemed right.

Then when I was invited to help renovate one of the Anglican churches in Moose Jaw, I decided that that was what I would do. The priests there at the time helped me to pursue the first steps towards ordination with the Anglican Church.

In 2010 I was ordained as an Anglican priest, at the same time as Dean Pinter (a former student of Annabel's). The two of us worked together in Kindersley and Eston.

And then in 2015, we came to Regina (finally!) when the Bishop called me to be executive officer of the Diocese. I was supposed to be working in the office during the week and preaching at various churches on Sundays. But the work in the office was impossibly heavy and I couldn't find time to preach.

You've been involved in so many different denominations. What brought you to FBC?

We were attending an Anglican church in Regina when Sue received the city-wide invitation from John Nelson to sing in the seasonal choir at First Baptist. Their parents had known each other in Calgary. When she came to FBC she found it so warm and welcoming that she decided to make it her church home.

Meanwhile I could see the writing on the wall for my job at the Anglican church and decided to hand in my resignation. For a few months I was free to join Sue at FBC and got involved in a number of its ministries. Particularly meaningful was the small group that met weekly in Annabel's home to read the Old Testament. I could share my gifts and made some deep friendships. [And what a contribution you both made! (Annabel)] I also valued the invitation to teach a class for Learning For Life.

I needed a job, and although I was offered two different positions in Calgary, Sue and I both felt strongly that we should stay in Regina.

Most recently I've accepted a part time position with the Anglican church in Lumsden. This enables us to stay here and worship once a month at FBC, as well as being involved in some of the mid-week events.

Thank you, Dell and Sue. You mean so much to us here. Your eventful and—dare I say it?—stressful lives have taught you so much about faith, learning to live on so little and trusting God to provide. The way you share it is a blessing to us all.
