# Report of the Chair of the Diaconate

The diaconate, a group of deacons chosen and elected by the congregation, is given authority over all aspects of the business of the Church and works in cooperation with pastors over all aspects of the ministry of the Church. The diaconate meets monthly with one or more of the pastors and at least twice yearly with the greater leadership of the congregation.

### 2019 highlights

- The year saw the addition of Richard Hovey and Kayely Rich to our pastoral staff. In my opinion both have been a terrific blessing to our church and they are everything we hoped for and more!
- The trip to Lebanon proved to be a powerful faith builder to many in our church as
  participants shared the insights they gained from the trip. God is truly at work in the
  world.
- Our goal of stabilizing church attendance was accomplished, and maybe, just maybe we are seeing very slight growth.
- The Organ scholarships have been launched, and we hope to attract more interest.
- The congregation dug deep into their pockets and strongly supported the church. We had started the year on a larger than normal budget fearing we would be running a \$20K deficit or more and ended up with a \$20K surplus. The diaconate has taken this a sign of confidence from the congregation that we are on the right track. We feel truly blessed to be entering 2020 in again improved financial position.
- The church strongly supported Katepwa Lake Camp (KLC) both financially and with people during a crisis year for them.
- Slowly a vision of where FBC could go in terms of a specific vision and mission for us is emerging. There is still much work to be done here, but bit by bit consensus is forming both within the diaconate and the congregation.

This second year of my diaconate chair has been a busy one for me. Besides 15 trips to Brandon to clear out my mother's house, in June the KLC director and KLC parted ways, turning the KLC board into a working board. The board of KLC, with 6 days to camp, found themselves with camp facilities in disarray, and no hired staff for summer camp. In what I can only describe as a miracle, things came together and we managed to run summer camp. I had taken on the role of treasurer in May, and it was a steep learning curve for me trying to come up to speed on our various financial components of running KLC. The impact of this turmoil on FBC was that a number of initiatives at FBC were not pursued by me, and these initiatives unfortunately sat on the shelf. I welcome Ron Phillips to the position of chair of the diaconate, and see that he is already making substantial progress on a number of fronts.

## **Treasurer's Report - 2019**

First Baptist Church is active in a great many ministries and has finances that are more complicated than many other churches. In addition to financing the normal day-to-day activities necessary for our church life (operating expenses), we have a number of restricted reserves that are dedicated to specific purposes.

We had a very good year financially in 2019, mostly due again to some large donations at the end of the year. As our financial statements show, our overall revenue exceeded our expenses in 2019, which provides us with an excellent beginning to 2020. We have a loan with the CBWC of just over \$250,000 to which we make monthly payments against both principle and interest to that loan. With the current amortization, we would expect this loan to be paid off in 2031.

Detailed financial information follows in the audited statements, but highlights are presented below.

### **Operations**

Church leadership manages the operating expenses of the various commissions and ministries. Personnel accounted for about 60% of the operating budget in 2019. Property, Administration and Missions also have significant budgets. The church staff and leadership have been carefully monitoring expenses, which resulted in less spending than was budgeted.

#### **Restricted Reserves**

Separate Restricted Reserve fund accounts were established in 2017 for special long-term financial items. Expenses and revenue related to these funds were managed separately from the operating budget.

The Benevolent Fund is for special financial aid to individuals and families. It is administered by the pastoral staff with accountability to the Diaconate. This is part of our approved budget and donations are requested when the fund is low. During 2019, this fund provided about \$2,400 in support. The fund had about \$2,200 at year-end.

The Building Fund is for larger capital expenses related to building repair. During 2019 we had several projects that the fund supported, including the furnace replacement at the Youth Centre, and repairing and painting the lower hall. The fund had just over \$19,000 at year-end.

The Organ Fund is for expenses related to the maintenance and use of the pipe organ. This fund has had significant donations through estate bequests over the years, including another significant amount in 2019. The fund had a total of about \$257,000 at year-end. This includes an investment of \$90,000 in GICs and \$30,000 in CBWC's Mission Impact Fund (MIF). The CBWC has discontinued the MIF and returned our funds at the end of the year.

The Legacy Fund was created a number of years ago to hold funds to support special outreach projects from our church that were not part of the annual budget. The main source of money to this fund is intended to be from estates and special gifts. The fund had about \$17,000 at yearend.

#### General

About 12% of our revenue is from property use, not donations. The largest is the facility agreement with Regina Youth for Christ who pay market value rent of the Youth Center. We do return about 38% of that rent as part of our missions support to their ministry. We also received payments from the Christ's Commission Fellowship for the use of the sanctuary for their services.

Through 2019, Shelly Pippin CPA Prof. Corp. continued to provide bookkeeping services. We are very appreciative of the work and assistance that Shelly and her staff are providing. The Finance Committee continued with the same membership of Derrick Bellows, Marv Fuller, Gloria Toews and Murray Wolfe who worked hard to ensure that our financials were properly managed through the year. I thank them for their commitment and hard work. I also thank the Diaconate, Commissions and staff for their diligence in managing the financial resources entrusted to them. This was my second year as Treasurer, and I thank you, the family of First Baptist, who continue to provide the finances for the work of our church.

# **Learning for Life**

In Learning for Life we have had a variety of sessions with different people taking part over this past year. In September we started with a session on Prayer and the Psalms entitled "God, it's me again." This series included learning about the practice of family Psalm reading, with aspects of Lectio Divina. Patterns of prayer were also looked at within the Psalms. This series was led primarily by Reade and Jennifer Holtslander and Dell Bornowsky.

Next we had a study of the book of Ezekiel led by Dr. Kelvin Friebel. This class began with information on how to read Old Testament prophecy followed by an introduction to the book of Ezekiel. The remainder of the classes were broke down by different key chapters in Ezekiel, including: Ezekiel's call to be a prophet, Ezekiel's weird behaviour, Israel the unfaithful wife, God and the foreign nations, and God restoring his presence. A second class, taught by Ron Phillips, was running at the same time as the class on Ezekiel. Ron's class was broken into two segments: "Stories about Jesus" and "Stories Jesus Told." The first segment looked at stories from Jesus' life, taken primarily from the Gospels, with the hope of getting to know Jesus better. The second segment looked at stories Jesus told (parables) which taught about the Kingdom of God.

In January we began to work through the book of Job, led by Richard Hovey, asking questions such as: What do we do with pain, grief, and anger caused by life circumstances? How do we maintain a living faith in midst of our suffering and the silence of God? The story of Job, and the character Job specifically, had been our example in answering these questions. This study will be finishing at the end of March and will be followed by a study on the book of Romans, taught by Annabel Robinson. Interestingly, Romans is going to be studied backwards, starting with the long list of names in chapter 16 and the social and spiritual problems of chapters 14 and 15. The rest of the book will be read in light of what is discovered in these closing chapters.

As we finish up our study on Job and enter into Romans, we will be planning for Fall sessions for Learning for Life. If you have any particular topic or book of the Bible you feel would be good for us to work through together in community, please let us know. The Learning for Life Committee consists of Ron Phillips, Annabel Robinson, and Esther Wiens.

At the luncheon we raised an additional \$2,219 for our CBM Lebanese Partnership. With the \$5,542 raised at the May Luncheon, we raised a total of \$7,661, again surpassing our goal of matching our \$7500 CBM budget. Total for CBM Lebanese Partnership in 2020: \$15,161.
