



Finances

To the end of November, our revenue is around 11% below our YTD budget. We have also kept our expenses to about 11% below YTD budget, resulting in a current deficit of \$3,300 (spending more than our income). We have been paying back the loan from our Organ Fund, so the Restricted Reserve Balance has increased, while the outstanding loan amount has decreased.

Preparing Our Hearts for Joy

Pastor Kayely's sermon from December 13, 2020 (A summary)

Scripture: Luke 1:26-38; Mary's Song - Luke 1:46-56

Fear not. That's what the angel said to her.

I wonder what would have happened if Mary had remained in fear?

The angel, Gabriel, had come to Mary to reveal a wild and crazy plan. Gabriel explained to her how God had chosen her to bring about the LONG expected coming of the Messiah. Kind of like this year has felt...plus a few hundred more years.

I wonder what Mary felt as she listened to Gabriel. I wonder if she had thoughts and questions racing through her mind. Is this really happening? What will Joseph think? What will my family think? Will anyone believe me, that I, a virgin, am bearing the Messiah? I wonder if Mary was scared as she pondered how her life would change?

I wonder if she wanted to run from the angel, shouting "No, no, no, this is too much for me!"

I wonder how you are feeling as you prepare for Christmas this year? Are you or someone you care about wanting to run from this crazy year shouting "No, no, no, this is too much for me!"? Are you experiencing feelings of worry, fear, sadness, depression, frustration, exasperation and more? What do you do in response to these feelings?

Fear Not. God has not forgotten you either. Just as God had not forgotten the people of Israel who were awaiting the coming Messiah...God has not forgotten us in 2020. Though this past year has been challenging in a number of ways, fear not, for our brothers and sisters in Christ - across both time and the world - have been sustained by our Lord God and we will get through these challenges together.

Having heard all that the angel said, Mary was able to respond "May your word be fulfilled." I wonder what it was that helped Mary be able to say yes to God's plan even though it would be a mix of joy and challenges? I wonder how Mary felt joy as she said yes to God? Looking ahead to next week, I wonder how Mary knew that it would be good to go stay with her cousin Elizabeth as the baby grew in her womb? I wonder how she knew that good community was what she needed to prepare her for what was ahead?

What it is that helps you say yes to God in your life?

How it is that you prepare your heart to experience joy?


What it is that you need today so you can face challenges ahead of you?

How it is that we lean into community in the midst of current restrictions?

As a staff team, we've been talking about how we can care for the people of First Baptist and the people in our circles beyond the church. We have brainstormed an array of ideas, but we would love to know from you: What would you like to see? What would be most helpful to you and those around you? What do you need to face your current challenges and return to a place of joy? Would you please reach out to one of our pastoral staff if there is a way we can support your well-being or if there's a way we can help you reach out to others in your sphere of influence who are struggling right now?

To wrap up, I want to offer you a simple exercise—should you wish to try it—that is great for taking our whole bodies from a place of racing heart, butterfly stomach, tense muscles, and more to a place of calm, a place where you can experience the Hope, peace, joy and love of Christ.

Sticking with our Christmas theme, I want you to visualize a star, like the one pictured here. It has 5 points. Draw an imaginary line towards the first point. As you do, breathe in deeply and slowly through your nose. When you get to the point, hold your breath for just a moment, then draw the line away from the point as you breathe out through your mouth.



As you familiarize yourself with this activity, it is easy to add brief prayer lines as you breathe:

{breathe in} Come Lord Jesus {hold} {breathe out} Cast out fear

{breathe in} Come Lord Jesus {hold} {breathe out} Cast out worry

{breathe in} Come Lord Jesus {hold} {breathe out} Cast out sadness

{breathe in} Come Lord Jesus {hold} {breathe out} Cast out anger

{breathe in} Come Lord Jesus {hold} {breathe out} Cast out (choose whatever feels most appropriate to you here)

I encourage you to try this simple exercise, and hope you find it helpful to you in the moments where emotions become strong and you desire to bring your body to a place of calm. May the breaths and the prayers be comforting to you.

 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the PayPal Giving Fund (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via FBC ChurchTrac (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
