I wonder if Jesus gets bored of the sunrise or the sunset? Does Jesus get bored of the same thing, over and over again? Does Jesus get bored of hearing us say the same thing over and over? Do we?

I came across a similar question in Dorothy Day's reflections on prayer.



Some people told her that her regular prayers were empty repetition and dead liturgy. She disagreed. "The very fact of repetition means that the will is directed to God, that there is an attempt to practice the presence of God. The sense of strain that may at first come with it is no reason for giving up." Perhaps there is someone reading this who can say that every day, their hearts always turn toward God. How enviable!



For myself, I've found the need to say things even if it wasn't what was going on in my heart. On occasion, I've kissed my children goodnight and repeated the liturgy - "I love you" – without any awareness of the gift of the moment. Often enough, after speaking it, the right feeling has come along in its own time. In fact, the habitual repetition sometimes wakes me up. I say the

same words every night, and sometimes it dawns on me again: this person is precious, this moment is precious.

But if we have neither the feeling nor the words, where does that leave us?

I'm grateful for the prayer practices I've been given by the church for Sundays, mornings, and evenings. Sometimes, my mind or my heart is elsewhere. Sometimes, I'm reluctant to step forward for shame. I know what the good choice is: to choose to pray. Sometimes, the repeated words become a sunrise.

This is an easy way for anyone who is limited to a telephone for communication, to hear the sermon from a recent worship service. This number takes you straight to the sermon recording—there are *no* menu or option choices that you will be required to make. ## **Spiritual Disciplines Series: A Rule of Life**

Stephen Macchia writes: "Your personal rule of life is a holistic description of the Spiritempowered rhythms and relationships that create, redeem, sustain, and transform the life God invites you to humbly fulfill for Christ's glory." What could you include in your day, week, month, and year that would create a rhythm to your life which would position you to best serve God?

As you are probably aware, plants position themselves to receive as much direct light as possible from the sun. A rule of life reflects on the practices of the spiritual life, and asks the question: "Which of these practices will best position me to receive the most from the Lord?"

Now it needs to be noted that, no matter what we do, it is ultimately up to God how much he chooses to reveal to us. Yet, we ought to do whatever we can to be ready to receive from him, all that he has for us.

Ken Shigematsu states: "A rule of life helps develop a life patterned on proven practices that help cultivate character and contribute to the world."

What practices could you include in your life to help you cultivate character? Think of disciplines such as Bible reading, prayer, confession, solitude and silence. Which of these might be helpful for you during this season?

What practices may help you contribute to the world? Hospitality, service, simplicity, and submission are a few that come to mind that might help you in this way. Are there two or three of these that you could be intentional about at this time in your life?

As you plan, decide which ones will be daily activities, which ones weekly, and which ones monthly. Again, the goal is to experience God more in our day-to-day lives. Shigematsu goes on to write: "A rule of life is simply a rhythm of practices that empowers us to live well and grow more like Jesus by helping us experience God in everything."

An article for the C. S. Lewis Institute explains all of this well. It notes that a Rule of Life is an intentional pattern of spiritual disciplines that provides structure and direction for growth in holiness. A Rule of Life establishes a rhythm for life which is helpful for being formed by the Spirit, a rhythm that reflects a love for God, and respect for how he has made us. The disciplines which we build into our rhythm of life help us to shed the "old self" and allow our "new self" in Christ to be formed. Spiritual disciplines are means of grace by which God can nourish us.



### A New Life

Pastor Richard's sermon from Sunday, January 24, 2021 (A summary—to hear the complete sermon, dial (306) 992-1912.)

Scripture: Jonah 3:1-4:2; Mark 1:14-20; Matthew 11:7-10

Jonah was hesitant to go to Nineveh because he understood something of the grace or mercy of God. God called Jonah to go to Nineveh with a word of warning, due to the evil way in which the people there were living. While initially disobedient, Jonah finally went to Nineveh and proclaimed the word of God – to which the Ninevites repented, turned from their evil ways and listened to God. In light of this, in his mercy, God decided not to destroy these people, which is what Jonah knew would happen. Although God is gracious, and extends his grace to any and all, the grace of God is also a call to repentance.

John the Baptist came preaching a message of "Repent, for the kingdom of God is at hand." John's message was one calling people into the Kingdom of God. In reflecting on who John was, in Matthew 11, Jesus states a couple of things that John was not and one thing that John was. John was *not* a reed shaken by the wind; John was *not* a man who changed his opinion based upon the opinions of others. No, John's message was consistent: Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand.

Secondly, John was not a prince dressed in fine clothes. Princes are to be found in the King's house, living well – John was living out in the desert, eating locusts and wearing clothing that was less then fine fabrics. John was not interested in position or prestige, but rather the true proclamation of the Word of God. John was a prophet.

Jesus, following John's arrest (at which time John *did* find himself in a king's palace, but, due to his unshaken resolve to preach the Word of God and call people to repentance, as a prisoner rather than a prince), proclaimed the same message: Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand. This call to repent is a call to change one's ways, much like the people of Nineveh did. It is to choose the ways of God over the evil ways of this world. Jonah, John, and Jesus were all presenting a choice, grounded in the grace of God, to the people they spoke to: Repent.

In Mark 1, where we find Jesus continuing to proclaim this same message (repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand), immediately following this we also find that Jesus calls fisherman to come and follow him (to be his disciples). These fishermen leave their nets and follow Jesus; Jesus tells them that what they are to become is fishers of people. As we repent, giving our lives to the Kingdom of God, the message of repentance then becomes *our* message, as we continue the work of Christ.

  - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
