### **Carried by Friends**

Pastor Joel's sermon from Sunday, February 7th, 2021 (A summary—to hear the complete sermon, dial (306) 992-1912.)

Scriptures: Isaiah 40.21-31; Psalm 147:1-11; Mark 2.1-12

A paralyzed man came to Jesus and Jesus said, "Your sins are forgiven."

Does this seem wrong or awkward to you? It makes me squirm a bit. The man's need was obvious. He was suffering.

This story brings to light a common dilemma for believers. God sees us and the world differently than we see them. We may have something we believe is urgent for our wellbeing or the world's wellbeing, but God may see something else we need even more. We look at the man on the mat and maybe see a problem to fix. But Jesus saw something else.

Why did four people carry their friend to Jesus? They had hauled him for who knows how long, only to find Jesus in a home so full that people were crowded around the doorway. Then they hauled him onto the roof, looking for a separate entrance. Finding none, they resolved to dig through the roof. Why all of this effort? Was it because their friend was so burdened by his sins? Or was it in hopes that Jesus would heal their friend's leg?

I want to know this: After all they had been through, how did the man and his friends react when Jesus said, "Your sins are forgiven"? Do you think they said, "Great! Let's pull him back up now and haul him home and celebrate!"

First though, what do we learn about Jesus here? He is certainly able to keep calm through surprising events! We also see that Jesus is empathetic and compassionate. He is moved by the faith of the man's friends. Jesus is able to understand what is going on in people's hearts and minds. He sees the faith of the friends, and he sees what others in the crowd are thinking in their hearts.

With that in mind, consider this possibility. Perhaps Jesus' words, "You are forgiven" meant more to the man than we know. It is possible that this man needed to hear those words more than anything else Jesus could have said or done – even more than walking again.

In Mark's gospel, Jesus addresses different things in different people as if he sees the one thing that person needs at that point in life.

Another example is the rich young ruler, whom we will meet later on in Mark. Jesus looked at him and said, "This one thing you lack: go and sell everything and come, follow me."

Jesus, looking at the man on the mat, somehow knew the man needed to hear, "Your sins are forgiven." Jesus does heal the man, but Mark emphasizes that Jesus did this to prove to the man that his sins were forgiven, and that he had authority on earth to forgive sins.

It is essential as believers that we know our sins are forgiven. Jesus has the authority to forgive any and all sins: All sin completely, totally, finally, and fully. Some of us need to hear that more than others. But not everyone. What is the one thing God needs to say to you, right now in your life?

  - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
  - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
  - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
