The Cleansing Power of Jesus' Words

Pastor Joel's sermon from Sunday, January 31st, 2021 (A summary—to hear the complete sermon, dial (306) 992-1912.)

Scripture: Deuteronomy 18:15-20; Psalm 111; Mark 1:21-28

The Gospel of Mark emphasizes Jesus' authority over sin, illness, health, and even over nature itself. Jesus began teaching in the synagogue in Capernaum. In this story, Mark connects Jesus' authority over unclean spirits with the power of his word, which brings cleansing, healing, and new life.

There are only two kinds of people who appear before Jesus in Mark's Gospel. There are the people who come to him in need and there are people who come to oppose him. People are either opposed to Jesus and quickly become part of a plot to undermine or arrest him, or they ask Jesus to have mercy on them.

Consider the disciples. They did not have to earn their place, it was a gift. They are honoured when Jesus invites them to become his students, but to the very end, they fail to understand Jesus' plans. A few times, they even try to change Jesus' mind or rebuke him. By Jesus' mercy, they continue to be his disciples. Jesus continues to love them and teach them to the end, even though he knows one of them will betray him and the rest will abandon him.

Consider all the others who come seeking forgiveness, freedom, healing, or teaching, such as the people who came to hear him teach, and the man with the unclean spirit in the synagogue in Capernaum.

Mark is making a biographical point about Jesus' character. He has compassion for the people he meets, he loves them, and helps each person who comes to him. He never gives in to arrogance or condescension. He never takes advantage of others. He remains humble, honest and pure, self-controlled, and forgiving.

Mark is also making a theological point. No one is an equal to Jesus. Jesus really stands alone. This true in all the gospels, but it is something that Mark emphasizes. Everyone who comes to Jesus, comes in need of *his* help.

We make a point of praying each Sunday as a group, and daily in our homes, for specific needs. We bring to him urgent concerns, and it is our conviction and our experience that God listens and acts.

However, by praying publicly for our needs every Sunday, and daily in our homes, we declare that weakness and neediness are part of our Christian identity. By confessing our sins on Sunday and every day, we publicly humble ourselves, and declare that we continue as disciples only because of Jesus' mercy.

Mark did not provide any examples of a person who came before Jesus without need of forgiveness, healing, freedom from unclean spirits, teaching, or understanding. The only ones who do not ask for Jesus' mercy are those who reject him.

Therefore, it is not as if some of us are weak and needy and others are fine. In fact, centuries of Christian teaching suggests that the closer a person is drawn toward Jesus, the more dependent they become, they more they become aware of their weaknesses.

Even though our strength is an unhelpful illusion, the temptation for independence is strong. Whether it is sinful behaviours, health issues, or knowledge and awareness, it is common for people to feel like something is wrong with them in particular when they are weak in one of these areas. We can't do anything about genetics, accidents, or aging, and yet sometimes we are proud that we are healthy or ashamed that we are struggling, whether it be physically or mentally. Similarly, we are sometimes proud of our knowledge, of knowing something that most people do not know, and sometimes we are ashamed that we do not understand or know what others seem to know. When it comes to our behaviour, who among us can say they are without sin? Yet often we veer back and forth between complacency and shame.

And what would it be like for a person to discover that they had an unclean spirit in them? What if that came to light before the congregation? Would we instinctively think less of that person? If it was me, would I feel greater shame?

Mark places everyone on the same level. We are all vulnerable to unclean spirits who accuse us and seek to control us. No person is better than another.

People seek ways to control their lives. We seek things to help us feel as if we have some say over how things are going, that we have access to strength and power on our own terms. The truth is, like the man with the unclean spirit, we are all at the mercy of Jesus. Every day, we are vulnerable and we are under attack by unclean spirits that we cannot see.

Jesus is with us. If we turn to him, Jesus is compassionate and merciful.

Jesus very words are cleansing, and healing, and powerful. Like the people who gathered in the synagogue at Capernaum, we gather every Sunday to listen to Jesus' words so that they might cleanse us and give us new strength. Daily, we open up our Bibles and, once again, listen to the words of Jesus. We are weak and needy and his words heal and cleanse us once again. Day after day, we can stop, listen, and ask Jesus for mercy.

We should also keep in mind Pastor Richard's words from last week. We are called to come to Jesus, and then to go and help others believe. We come in weakness and experience Jesus' cleansing, forgiving, and healing. This is a tangible and real experience we can share with others.

 - Use a credit or debit card via FBC ChurchTrac (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
