A Healthy Relationship With Food

The image I have of gluttony is of someone eating disgusting amounts of food. But actually, it is simply eating more than we need for the day. Given the abundance of food around us, we ought to be on alert. Gluttony is often listed among the "seven deadly sins." (A better translation might be the "seven deadly attacks.")

Food is meant to give us energy, but eating more than we need can leave us tired, weighed down, foggy, and slower. Unfortunately, we might turn to food for consolation, fulfilment, or out of boredom. We can begin to reach for second helpings or for snacks compulsively, even as an addiction. Food then becomes both unhealthy and an obstacle between us and God. In this way, sin is bad for our health, body, mind, and soul.



Fasting has long been encouraged to help

combat gluttony. Fasting can mean not eating at all. More often, however, what has been prescribed is to stop eating while still hungry, and to avoid meats and rich foods during one's fast. This kind of fasting was expected of everyone several times a year, and helped develop self-control.

Regardless of *how* you fast, fasting is always meant to be accompanied by prayer and scripture. This helps us experience that our bodies live on more than just food. Those are Jesus' own words, shared with us while he fasted in the wilderness. But I think we also know this from daily life. I can forget meals in the midst of an activity I'm enjoying. Music, a good book, a warm and sunny spring day, time with friends – these things give me energy. Conversely, grief, failure, or dreary chores can leave me exhausted. Our bodies need more than food. They live on words from God.

Food is meant to be a gift. Certainly it is functional. But God made what was functional to be pleasurable, joyful, and celebratory as well. God is good! Let's not overlook the reason Jesus gave for feeding the five thousand and the four thousand: He didn't want people to go away hungry. He loved them and wanted them to eat. All meals fall under the rule of the greatest meal, the Lord's Supper. Food is for communion, people united in thanksgiving for God's gifts of life and salvation.

Fasting with prayer, leading to self-control, is the means of ensuring that God's good gifts do not become harmful for our physical bodies or our relationship with God.


Morning Prayer

The Way of God

Pastor Richard's sermon from Sunday, March 7th, 2021 (A summary—to hear the complete sermon, dial (306) 992-1912.)

Scripture: Mark 9:30-50

Jesus spoke to his disciples about their being salt in this world. Then as it does now, salt provided a necessary function in the preservation of food. Yet then, as may be the case in some places now, salt was often adulterated so that it lost some of its preserving quality – lost its purpose. Jesus' concern with his disciples as he spoke to them of being salt in this world, was that they were in danger of losing their purpose as a result of their focus being adulterated. How? By not being at peace with each other.

In Mark 9:30-32, Jesus again shares with his disciples that he is going to be betrayed into human hands and be killed. But three days later (after being killed), he will rise. This is not the first time Jesus spoke with his disciples about what was going to happen to him, but they still did not quite grasp what this meant. They did not recognize the servant character of Jesus, described so beautifully by Paul in his letter to the church at Philippi. Paul wrote of Jesus: "Though he was in the form of God, (he) did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking on the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death – even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:6-8 NRSV). This was, and is, the heart of Jesus.

After telling his disciples once again what was going to happen to him, he travelled with his disciples to Capernaum. Most likely, as would have been normal for students travelling with their Rabbi, Jesus would have been out in front and the disciples following along behind Jesus. They were talking amongst themselves as they travelled. When they arrived at Capernaum and sat down in a home together, Jesus asked them what it was that they were discussing as they travelled. They were silent, for they had been discussing (arguing perhaps) about which of them was the greatest; a far cry from the humility and servanthood of Jesus.

Jesus takes this opportunity to instruct them on what is expected of them in the Kingdom of God. He brings a little child into their midst and teaches on the importance of welcoming one such as this – one without a voice, without position or status, without power. They are to find themselves not jostling for position, but rather becoming, as their Rabbi, a servant of all, and especially of the least of these. Their ministry is to be one of meekness and humility, servanthood and sacrifice. This is the way of God.

We live in a culture which is based on succeeding, moving up the ladder, and gaining ground in the arena of popularity and prestige. Those of us who are serious about our call in Christ, must recognize that this element of our culture does not lead to peace, but rather to competition. If we give in to this aspect of our own culture, we become adulterated and less effective in our witness to the Kingdom of God. May we hear the call to once again lay our lives down for each other – for the least of these – as we take up our cross and follow Jesus.


Tithing during the pandemic

- 3. Make an online donation:

 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
