
First Baptist Regina Weekly News

For the Week of June 13th, 2021

On the west side of Regina, on Pinkie Road, there is a small graveyard with around 36 unmarked graves of Indigenous children. It was only recently identified and fenced in. A residential school operated near there from 1891 to 1910. The true number of graves is unknown, as is the case at many of the 138 former Residential schools across Canada.

"Doing nothing to obviate the preventable causes of death, brings the Department of Indian Affairs within unpleasant nearness to the charge of manslaughter." This was the legal advice our federal government received in 1907.

Shortly afterwards, Saturday Night magazine wrote, "Indian boys and girls are dying like flies... Even war seldom shows as large a percentage of fatalities as does the education system we have imposed on our

Indian wards." A few years later, in 1913, Duncan Campbell Scott, then deputy superintendent-general of Indian Affairs wrote, "It is quite within the mark to say that fifty per cent of the children who passed through these schools did not live to benefit from the education, which they had received therein."

We cannot say that Canada did not know. We also cannot say that the death rate at the schools was the same among all children in Canada at the time, because it was much higher. And yet, the last school did not close until 1996.

I remember one Indigenous woman in our church recounting the day she heard that officials would be coming the following day to remove the children by force, so she packed up and walked away from the reserve, through the night, with her little ones.

We are approaching National Indigenous Day in Canada, June 21st. We can remember that we enjoy living on Treaty Four territory, the territories of the nêhiyawak (Cree), Anihšināpēk (Saulteaux), Dakota, Lakota, and Nakoda, and the homeland of the Métis Nation. We can ask ourselves if Canada has honoured the treaties it made in perpetuity.

We confess our sins and hear our absolution every Sunday. This is meant in part to help humanity to be reconciled one with one another. Sometimes reconciliation means repentance and restitution.



Increasing Capacity at Sunday Worship Services

Due to declining infection rates, our government has recently announced changes to the maximum gathering size allowed for places of worship, beginning May 30th. In light of this, we have increased our capacity level as of Sunday, June 6th.

As you are probably aware, we are all at different places regarding our comfort level in joining a public gathering. Some are already very comfortable being out in public. On the other hand, some have hardly ventured out of their homes for quite some time. In light of this, we can care for each other by being patient and gentle with those whose comfort level is different than ours.

While progress is being made in our goal of returning to a more normal way of life, the pandemic is not over yet. In order to keep each other safe, we will continue to follow all health guidelines for public gatherings. As a reminder, here are the main ones:


- 1. Everyone is required to wear a mask that covers their mouth and nose for the entire time they are at the church.
- 2. Everyone is required to wash their hands with sanitizer when they enter the building.
- 3. Everyone is required to follow the arrows on the floor. The ushers are there to help you. Please look to them for guidance.
- 4. A distance of 6 feet/2 metres is required between households.

- 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use Interac e-Transfer to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via FBC ChurchTrac (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
