The Source of Secrecy

What motivates us to seek recognition? It seems as though there is something inside of us that longs to be noticed, to be congratulated, to be seen and heard, recognized and applauded. It is a shifting of self *under* God to self *as a* god, where our identity is secured on the accolades of others. I think of the religious leaders in the time of Christ who performed their religious duties to be seen by the people. Jesus gives this



instruction: "Beware of practising your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven" (Matthew 6:1).

Secrecy is explained by Julia Roller and Richard Foster as: "Consciously refraining from having our good deeds and qualities generally known, which in turn, rightly disciplines our longing for recognition." Adele Calhoun notes the desire of secrecy as being, "to follow the simple, and often hidden, way of Christ," defining secrecy as "practicing the spirit of Christ reflected in hiddenness, anonymity, lack of display, and the holding of confidences." She goes on to explain what the discipline of secrecy can create within our lives, including: a secret place of intimacy with Jesus, a freedom from the hunger for notoriety, the ability to bear being misunderstood without needing to rationalize, and the ability to receive recognition well (properly).

In "The Good and Beautiful Life," James Bryan Smith has a chapter on "Learning to Live without Vainglory," in which he unpacks a false narrative that leads us away from secrecy and into pride or vainglory. He then presents a truer narrative that will help us live "secret lives" to the glory of God.

The false narrative: "My value is determined by your assessment." We all want (need) to be loved. When we live according to this false narrative, our need to be loved is temporarily assuaged by admiration (approval, acceptance, acknowledgement, etc.)

When living this way, Smith notes, "we are only as good as our next performance," and we are driven to perform (to practice our piety before others), because we long for their (hopefully great) assessment. The issue with this is that it is fleeting and leads us to always be focusing on our performance.

What is the better narrative? "You are valuable to God," writes Smith. "God loves you no matter what. Your worth is not dependent on your performance or on what others think of you. Your worth is found in the loving eyes of God." When we adopt this narrative, we can freely transition from public performance to secret service, knowing that our loving God sees what is done in secret.


Voice - A Women's Book club

Because of the cultural distance between the biblical world and our contemporary setting, we often bring modern Western biases to the text. For example, western individualism leads us to assume that Mary and Joseph traveled alone to



Bethlehem. What went without saying was that they were likely accompanied by a large entourage of extended family.




Tithes and Offerings

While many of you are coming to worship services in person now, there are also quite a number joining the service on Zoom or Facebook. Whether you are attending in person or online, there are several methods that you can use to give your tithes and donations to the church:

- 1. Mail your gifts to the church or call and leave a message at (306) 359-1450 to arrange for an in-person pick-up. Please place your cheque in your regular offering envelope (or any envelope marked "Offering"), and seal that inside another envelope addressed to: First Baptist Church, 2241 Victoria Ave, Regina, SK S4P 0S4.
- 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use Interac e-Transfer to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the PayPal Giving Fund (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
