We have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner place of God." *Hebrews, selected verses.*



I have wondered, where did I learn that there is a God who is involved in my life and in the world? Where did I get the idea that I could seek God? The longer I think about it, the more different people come to mind, whose example and care provided a model of following Jesus as the way of life.



My home was over a half hour from our church, and yet, a few younger men sacrificed their time to come and visit me as a young teen. Mr. Read, who afterwards went on to full time ministry, came many times for Bible studies, and then prepared me for baptism. After they moved away, he and his wife invited me to their home, even coming to pick me up, first from within Ontario, and then again after a move to Manitoba.



Rev. Bill Moreland was one of the elders of my congregation. He modelled the practice of appreciating the mundane and the sublime equally. When I visited him at his trailer, he delighted to show me the frog in his little pond to whom he fed worms. He told me several times about the frog he studied in dissection labs, whom he



named Ichabod. He would also reminisce about A.W. Tozer, and all he had learned from him about pastoral ministry and prayer. My pastor related how, upon arriving at the hospital to visit the old minister at the end of his life, Rev. Moreland greeted him from

his bed with, "Oh! Thank you for coming. God is so good!"

There was also Mr. and Mrs. Durkee who treated me similarly to a son. This couple volunteered to lead the youth group for many years, week after week, while raising four young children. Given the distance to my home after youth group, and often having to work nearby first thing in the morning, I frequently slept over at their home. I was spoiled with affirmation and prayer.

Tragedy struck this incredible couple. Their daughter, a toddler, died one night in her sleep, inexplicably. Their devastation and nearly overwhelming grief was unmistakable and yet they did not retreat from the teens in their youth group. They invited the youth group to carry the casket at the funeral and graveside. It was a profound gift of love and faith to all of us.

There was also Pastor Al, Pastor Dave Petrescue, Mr. Tatum, the Campbells, and more, who come to mind. I recall sitting in their homes as a child, during an adult Bible study, or sitting through morning and evening services, or church meetings, or camping and canoe trips when I was older, and being aware that they were there. I think it is quite likely that most of these folks have forgotten all about me, or have no idea that they influenced me. So many people, each in their own way, demonstrated that there is a God, that we can know God, and that we ought to worship and obey the Father, in Jesus' name, through the Holy Spirit.

I knew from their example that I had a choice to make. Would I seek to know God? Would I pray and listen, read the Bible and take part in church? Would I keep trying to live for God, and not for myself?

Perhaps you might sit and think about people of faith who have been a part of your life, and give thanks to God for each of them. Perhaps you might take heart to consider that, even if you are not aware of it, you have influenced others simply by taking part in prayer, worship, and service within our church family. All of us are caught up in being saved together.

Thank you for continuing to seek God, knowing that your faith touches everyone around you.


News from Heartland Baptist Women



Tithes and Offerings

While many of you are coming to worship services in person now, there are also quite a number joining the service on Zoom or Facebook. Whether you are attending in person or online, there are several methods that you can use to give your tithes and donations to the church:

- 1. Mail your gifts to the church or call and leave a message at (306) 359-1450 to arrange for an in-person pick-up. Please place your cheque in your regular offering envelope (or any envelope marked "Offering"), and seal that inside another envelope addressed to: First Baptist Church, 2241 Victoria Ave, Regina, SK S4P 0S4.
- 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use Interac e-Transfer to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via CanadaHelps (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
