Reaching Out to Our Community – December 18th

Over the last couple of months, a number of Regina churches have been meeting together to try to discern how we might respond to the increasing signs of poverty in our city. Last week, Louise Krueger, Barb Ziolkowski, and Joel Russell-MacLean met with representatives from Knox Met, the Salvation Army, First Presbyterian, Sunset United, Trinity Lutheran and the Catholic Archdiocese, to discuss what needs remained unmet through existing charities, and what role our churches might play in meeting those needs.

It was noted that, while there are free meals offered during the week, there is, to our knowledge, only one group that is offering



an open, free meal on the weekend. (The Sikh community distributes meals on Sunday in North Central.) Of the needs expressed, this was the first need we felt we could meet.

To this end, First Baptist will be hosting a free lunch and warming centre, December 18th, at 1:00 pm for the downtown and surrounding neighbourhoods. Other churches are partnering with us. Our role is to set up, host, and serve coffee.

We are looking for 4 to 6 volunteers, to help out from 11:00 am until approximately 3:00 pm, or some portion of that time period.

The lunch will be a bag lunch of sandwiches and other items, to be eaten offsite. We will set up some chairs and tables so that people can sit and warm up. We also hope this gives some of the volunteers a chance to sit and visit with our guests. We believe that, in order for this to serve as an outreach endeavor, relationships and hearing about each others' lives is crucial.

We are preparing for 200 people. The other churches will be bringing all the food items at 11:30 am. Everyone will help get everything into bags. Coffee and any additions will be served by First Baptist volunteers.

Masks must be worn at all times. Hands must be washed or sanitized upon entry. We will not be checking vaccination status.

On the following Monday, the churches will meet to evaluate the event to determine if it should continue in January. Homelessness and hunger appear to be on the rise in our city, with many charities noting a marked increase in demand compared to previous falls and winters. Churches are continuing to discuss supporting additional shelter space with emergency shelter providers. We also hope to serve our provincial government with updates from the front lines.

Let us know if you can help and if you would like to be involved in this sort of activity or planning going forward.

New Learning for Life Series Beginning January: The Gospel of John

John's Gospel has proved to be both accessible to those reading it for the first time, and increasingly challenging the more it is read. The whole Gospel is centred on Jesus and who he is. When John the Baptist is asked "Who are you" (1:19) his answer points to Jesus. Fast forward to 21:12: "Now none of the disciples dared to ask Jesus, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord." (21:12). Our reading of John will turn this question on each one of us. Who, in your experience, is Jesus?

You can prepare for it by reading the Gospel of John right through, as though you are reading it for the first time. It is helpful to use a different translation from the one you usually use, and if possible, one that has no chapter or verse numbers. I have a software version of the Bible in all sorts of translations. - 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use Interac e-Transfer to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via CanadaHelps (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
