

Charles Taylor has challenged me to look at people and society differently, paradoxically, both with more hope and with more concern.

Taylor is a world-renowned Canadian philosopher and a lifelong, faithful Catholic. As he approached 80, he wrote *A Secular Age*, to widespread praise. At 800 pages, it is imposing. But since large parts of it are a story, it can be, dare I say, fun to read. I believe you may have just raised your eyebrows. A number of folks at First Baptist have tackled it. Let me know if it interests you.

Taylor argues that we are secular today in large part *because* of the church, not *in spite* of the church. Centuries ago, the church worked to reform – to convert and transform – people and society, and the results have been mixed. He refutes as unhistorical the story



that science and learning have gradually made belief (seem) unnecessary. At first, this is how I experienced and appreciated *A Secular Age*, as a tool for apologetics. But Taylor has so much more than that to offer.

On the one hand, he's moved me away from pining for a lost time when most people believed, and also from viewing secularism or society as an enemy. I think he provides some reasons for why we become polarized, politically and theologically, and why the debate around identity and sexuality is so intense.

He also nudges me to think pastorally about society. He has nurtured in me a greater sensitivity to the hurts, the tendencies, and the needs of believers and non-believers alike, raised in a secular age. He offers some ideas about what we need to be doing as a church. In the spirit of John's Gospel, I feel Taylor encourages us to remember that "God so loved the world," to have compassion, and to work with hope.


Ladies' Breakfast Cancelled

Saturday Bag Lunch and Warming Centre Update



The Saturday lunches have been going well. Thank you to all who have been helping out in various ways.

On December 18th, Louise Krueger, Barb Ziolkowski, and Joel Russell-MacLean met with representatives from Knox Met, Sunset United, the Catholic Archdiocese, and First Presbyterian. At that meeting, it was decided that a bagged lunch and warming centre would be hosted weekly, beginning January 8th. It has also been decided that these events would be held at our church, as it is in a central location.

Up to this point in time, while other churches have been buying the food and preparing the sandwiches, some First Baptist folks have been involved each time with the set-up,

hosting, and clean up for these lunches. The plan is that, once things are better organized, the other churches involved would each take a turn hosting the event in its entirety, and, except when it is our turn to host, all we would need to do is let the hosts into the building. This plan is being worked on and should be in place soon. The goal is also to involve more churches from across our city in the preparation and hosting, so that everyone has a chance to help.

That said, *please note* that on Saturday, January 22nd, it will be our turn to prepare the bagged lunches to hand out that day. This includes making the sandwiches and purchasing the other items to go in the bags. Tithes and Offerings

- 1. Mail your gifts to the church or call and leave a message at (306) 359-1450 to arrange for an in-person pick-up. Please place your cheque in your regular offering envelope (or any envelope marked "Offering"), and seal that inside another envelope addressed to: First Baptist Church, 2241 Victoria Ave, Regina, SK S4P 0S4.
- 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use Interac e-Transfer to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (no fee or cost to the church... 100% of your donation reaches us and contributes to our mission)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a fee of 4% is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
