For the Week of May 1, 2022

The story of Israel is the story of refugees seeking a new home. As many have observed, Jesus became a refugee himself when his parents fled the murderous intentions of King Herod. On a more abstract level, perhaps we all sense that we've been cast out of Eden and are homeless until we meet Jesus. Scripture urges us repeatedly to welcome and care for people who come to us from other places — "the alien".

The current refugee situation globally is severe. Climate change is impacting food security and making ancestral homes uninhabitable. Wars in Afganistan and Iraq added to the numbers of refugees created regularly from Sudan, Congo, and Burma among others. Then the Syrian civil war escalated. The destruction and murder we are witnessing in Ukraine was carried out across Syrian thoroughly, by the same nation. Millions of



Syrians still live in tent cities and slums, with no homes to return to even if they didn't fear torture or death. And now the invasion of Ukraine has added millions more.

When we visited Lebanon, we saw firsthand how a nation of 4 million was hosting 1.5 million refugees. For Canada to act on the same level, we would have to welcome around 10 million refugees. We accept a few thousand every year. Our partners in Lebanon asked us to do what we can to help with the refugee crisis.

A few years ago, a Syrian refugee family, new to Canada, came to us looking for help. Their son and his family had been trapped, living in a tent, in the mountains in Lebanon, for years. They asked if we might be able to help get their son to Regina. Then, when we visited Lebanon in 2019, a few of us got to meet the son and his family. Further on in this letter, we've shared more information about the family and pictures of Raeed, his wife Maha, and their children.

We've recently received word that, after years of waiting, the family should be on their way any day now. This is an opportunity for us to be part of a profoundly joyful moment, of welcoming the lost, home. Please be in prayer and if there is something you might be able to give or share, let us know. (See list of needs on p. 3.)

Thank you for doing your part to make this congregation a warm, generous, and safe place.

Refugee Family Update

We are getting closer and closer to being able to welcome the Alhusain family – Raeed, Maha, Yamin (6), Emirate (5) and Amir (3), to Regina, the Syrian family that some of us have already met! The whole family has gone through the last steps, including interviews and medical appointments. They are just waiting for Visas and plane tickets! This can be a very quick turnaround – it may be only a couple of weeks until they get here!

Some furniture has been donated for the family already. (The library is being as a temporary storage space.) The following items are still needed:

- Beds 1 queen/king and 3 single (possibly can get by with 2 smaller kids beds)
- Linens
- Dressers
- Coffee table
- Kids clothes

If you are able to donate any of these items, please call the church at (306) 359-1450 or send an email to the church.

It would be great to have a lively church presence at the airport, when the family arrives. (Some of us have been present for a few family reunions at the airport and they have, without a doubt, been emotional and dramatic examples of love and togetherness after trauma and separation – glimpses of what it means to be the larger family of God on earth.)

We will keep the congregation updated as we get nearer to the family's arrival. We would like to gather a list of names that can be called on to meet the family at the airport, and respond to needs that arise throughout the summer. Details will be coming soon about a new fund that will be set up to continue to sponsor refugee families to come to Regina. This will allow our congregation to be an ongoing practical support for those fleeing war, reuniting with loved ones, and trying to get their lives back on track after trauma and displacement.



- 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use a credit or debit card to make a donation from our website. (*The church is charged a small processing fee for each donation.*)
 - Use **Interac e-Transfer** to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the PayPal Giving Fund (no fee or cost to the church – 100% of your donation reaches us)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a 4% fculatoee is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
