As you imagined being present at Pentecost, what came to your mind? Feel free to pause and take your time re-reading the first paragraph or go into more depth by reading Acts 2:1-41.

For myself, I can't help but think of some very exciting days in my own life with all the emotional energy and excitement that came with them. Experience has taught me, however, that I need ordinary days between these exciting times to come back down to earth, so to speak, and to process the big exciting moments of life. I need times of normalcy and times of rest. But what did the believers do after the exciting times at Pentecost? "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42)

As we transition into the summer season in the northern hemisphere, we too have an opportunity to process some of the excitement that has been going on in our lives – both the positive events and the more challenging circumstances. I want to encourage you to do so in community, as much as you are able.



We are hoping to host a variety of fellowship events over the coming months. I encourage you to join as you are able. I encourage you to come and share what you are learning as you follow Jesus and ask others the same. I encourage you to pray together and eat together. And when these things aren't possible in person, I encourage you to find alternate ways to devote yourselves to the community of believers so

that, together, through the ordinary, we might all be encouraged to walk closer to Jesus and enjoy praising God together.



The novel chosen for the June 22nd study is "A Long Walk to Water," by Linda Sue Park. The book begins as two stories, told in alternating sections, about two eleven-year-olds in Sudan. One is a girl, in 2008 and the other, a boy, in 1985. The girl, Nya, is fetching water from a pond that is a two-hour walk from her home: She makes two trips to the pond every day. The boy, Salva, becomes one of the "lost boys" of Sudan, refugees who cover the African continent on foot, as they search for their families and for a safe place to stay. Enduring every hardship from loneliness, to attack by armed rebels, to contact with killer lions and crocodiles, Salva is a survivor, and his



story goes on to intersect with Nya's in an astonishing and moving way. Includes an afterword by author Linda Sue Park and the real-life Salva Dut, on whom the novel is based, and who went on to found the organization, "Water for South Sudan."

However, it is also worth noting that giving to the end of May is lower than it was at this time last year. We recognize that costs are rising these days and pray for God's provision personally and corporately. We thank you in advance for the gifts you are able to make as we head into these summer months. Your ongoing contributions are helpful to us in planning, as we are hoping to hire more pastoral staff soon.

Tithes and Offerings

- 2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
- 3. Make an online donation:
 - Use a credit or debit card to make a donation from our website. (*The church is charged a small processing fee for each donation.*)
 - Use Interac e-Transfer to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (no fee or cost to the church)
 - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the PayPal Giving Fund (no fee or cost to the church – 100% of your donation reaches us)
 - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (a 4% fee is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
