Fall 2022 Sermon Series – Ezra and Nehemiah

From now until Advent, we will be looking at the Old Testament Books of Ezra and Nehemiah. Here is some background information on these two books. (See maps on page 4.)

Time Line

This time line will help you understand the context of the exile and restoration and the events described in Ezra and Nehemiah with related maps.

| 900 - 612 BC | The Neo-Assyrian Empire |
|--------------|---|
| 721 BC | The fall of Israel, its end as a nation, the deportation of its people, and the resettlement of people from other conquered regions. Found in 2 Kings 17. |
| 701 BC | Assyria invades Judah but Jerusalem is not taken. Found in 2 Kings 18-19, and Isaiah 36-37. |
| 612 BC | Nineveh is sacked by armies led by Babylon and Medes |
| 586 BC | The fall of Jerusalem to Babylon, the destruction of the temple, the city and the walls, and the deportation of its people. Found in 2 Kings 24-25, and Jeremiah 37-43. |
| 550 - 330 BC | The Persian (or Achaemenid) Empire |
| 539 BC | The fall of Babylon; King Cyrus' blessing for the exiles to return and rebuild |
| 559 - 530 BC | King Cyrus - The return of exiles, perhaps with Sheshbazzar |
| 530 - 522 BC | King Cambyses II |
| 522 - 486 BC | King Darius - The Return of exiles with Zerubbabel and Jeshua, Haggai and Zechariah |
| 485 - 465 BC | King Xerxes - (perhaps King Ahasuerus in Esther) |
| 465 - 424 | King Artaxerxes - The return of exiles with Ezra and Nehemiah |
| 330 BC | End of the Persian Empire – conquered by Alexander the Great (Greek king) |

Background Notes on Ezra and Nehemiah

Ezra and Nehemiah were originally treated as one "book." There are three distinct sections covering a long period of time, from around 530 to 424 BC.

Section One - Ezra 1 - 6

These chapters appear to cover two different periods when exiles returned to Judah. Chapter 1 covers King Cyrus' proclamation encouraging the return of exiles and the offer to pay for the rebuilding and restoration of worship (Persians did this for several groups exiled by Assyria and Babylon). Chapters 2 to 6 record the return of exiles with Zerubbabel and Jeshua during the reign of King Darius, and the efforts to rebuild the temple.

However, note that Ezra chapter 4 summarizes local threats and interference over a period of 100 years and through the reign of five Persian Kings (from Cyrus to Artaxerxes). If you read quickly from chapter 3 to 5, it is easy to miss that such a long time is being covered before, in chapter 5, the story goes back to the time of King Darius.

Section Two – Ezra 7 - 10

Ezra leads the return of a group of exiles during the reign of Artaxerxes.

Section Three - Nehemiah 1 - 14

Nehemiah takes a leave from his high ranking position before King Artaxerxes in order to help rebuild Jerusalem and to lead the people.

Some Further Observations

Ezra and Nehemiah at first seem like a straightforward story, with one event following another. But reading them through like this might be misleading. As you can see from the time line, these books cover about 100 years of activity, a succession of kings, and several generations of exiles.

As well, parts of Ezra and Nehemiah seem like bureaucratic government reports. Government edicts and commissions dominate each section. The official documents are included. The books then carefully record how these orders were fulfilled, by whom, how much was spent, what was purchased, who helped, and who resisted. The government letters seem authentic and parts of Ezra and Nehemiah might be reports they submitted to the government. Genealogies connected to inherited occupations and areas of residence are also meticulously recorded for posterity.


There appears to be more than one author. We find Ezra writing in the first person ("I"), Nehemiah writing in the first person, and sometimes both are written about as if by someone else.

The order of the books doesn't seem to be chronological. Nehemiah 8-10 appear to be part of the story found in Ezra 9-10, while Nehemiah 11-12 fit better following the events of Nehemiah 6. Nehemiah 7:6-73 is a nearly exact copy of Ezra 2:1-3.1. An indefinite period of time appears to have passed between the events of Nehemiah 12 and 13, but it isn't clear.


Finally, Ezra 10 and Nehemiah 13 are very strange conclusions to all these great stories of hard work, faith, and endurance.

A final author appears to have collected all these documents and stories and, with Spirit-inspired purpose, created a unified book. What do you think that purpose is? What lessons are we meant to learn from these stories? How should God's people feel about these pagan kings and their global empires? What does it mean to return to the city of God? What all has to be rebuilt? What does purity look like? Can their vision ever succeed? Take some time to read these books again, along with Haggai and Zechariah (for a real challenge!) Let me know what you discover!

Thanks to those who managed these projects and to those who helped move things around to accommodate the work.







 - Use a credit card or PayPal via CanadaHelps (a 3.5% fee is deducted from the donation)
 - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation)
