

# First Baptist Regina Weekly News

*For the Weeks of December 11 & 18, 2022*

On Sunday the 4th, following communion, around 100 people gathered in the lower hall for our first Christmas meal together in three years. It was a good time with friends, family, and a few guests and visitors. Thank you so much to all those who planned and prepared it.



Our concert season is upon us with concerts on December 9th, 10th and 11th. Our church also recently hosted the University of Regina's choir. Musicians and singers have been here every night of the week practicing. By caring for our building and relationships, we have been able to support the people who keep music alive and growing in our city.

We continue to host the Saturday lunch program where free bag lunches are given out to folks in need. Churches of all kinds are already signing up to help through next June. There is a real joy and sense of camaraderie in working together to prepare and serve the lunch. I think the Holy Spirit rejoices in churches working together to take care of folks. Many of the people who come are believers themselves and they share their blessing with us.

Also, I think people from across the city are looking for any way to respond to the homelessness that has rapidly increased in our city in the past few years. As we walk outside into the bitter wind, it is shocking to think that some of our neighbours are sleeping outside overnight.

This week, our city council is debating if there is more they can do. The cost for the proposed project, as presented publicly, was very high, although still less than the cost of other past and future capital projects, such as Mosaic Stadium. However, charities, other municipalities, and the city's own budget all publicly report that the actual costs for the very programs proposed are much lower than what has been reported, and therefore, would not result in the enormous tax increase suggested in the news. It is hard to understand why there is such a difference. I'm happy to discuss this with anyone who wants to know more or wants to share what they've learned. There's time to call or write your city councillor with your concerns either way.

Please remember our city councillors in prayer this week as they debate the budget. Unfortunately, their discussions have been presented publicly as bitter disagreements, which can't make this time any easier.

Even more, remember those living among us who are homeless and hungry.

Thank you for being such warm and hospitable people. As scripture says, remember that by welcoming strangers, some have entertained angels without knowing it.

In our rush to get to the manger, we are tempted to downplay—or completely ignore—the Advent themes that the Church has long believed are necessary so that we can come to the cradle of Christ in the right way.”

Dan Clendenin: “Praying to God for mighty acts of deliverance is an entirely human and genuinely Christian response to the pain and suffering of the world, of our neighbours, and of our own lives. I intend never to stop praying for God’s miraculous intervention; such prayers remain a staple of my morning runs. But the season of Advent that we now enter adds an important qualification. God is not a Cosmic Concierge. Human experience gives the lie to the delusion, so deeply embedded in the American psyche, that every problem has a solution and that every question has an answer. Sometimes we must wait.”

Lamin Sanneh who teaches missions and world Christianity and history at Yale Divinity School says “God has staked the divine honour on the project to redeem and sanctify...God’s word [is] powerful; it places God at the center of our ventures, as the first and final surety. Christians, therefore, wait for the feast to come with grateful hearts even though in the interim their minds are set on unresolved troubles and unreachable horizons. Advent is quality time, not because of its [noisy] and crowded demands, but because it provides a time for us to receive God’s word and to collaborate in its fulfillment by being the connecting rod between vision and action.” (<http://www.religion-online.org/showarticle.asp?title=922>)

As a latecomer to Advent-celebrating churches, I found myself woefully ignorant of its tradition and practises. The idea of spending time in lament and even despair for several weeks prior to the excitement of the celebration of Christ’s birth was originally abhorrent to me, in all my ignorance of the Advent season. And yet it made sense of my hitherto unexplained sadness, all through my adult life, in the weeks preceding Christmas. Since the time of my recognition of Christ as the way to God, I knew something had changed in my emotional response prior to the annual Christmas celebration, a kind of darkness in my thoughts and feelings, but I had no explanation for it. Finally I discovered the season of Advent. Indeed it is a time for introspection, for admission that my life is not all it should be; a time to examine the darkness surrounding a world of political upheaval, wars, economic crises and violence; a time to admit that neither I nor the most experienced of world leaders have answers that will ultimately rescue the world around us; a time to face the darkness and despair around the globe and the accompanying feeling of hopelessness.

Participating deliberately in the Advent season is giving me new hope in the deliverance the birth of Jesus Christ is bringing not only to me but to all the suffering world. The truth that Jesus Christ is indeed The Answer is even more meaningful as I now deliberately allow myself to feel, during the Advent weeks, deep sadness for the misery of our world, to contemplate my own personal failures and distresses, to begin to grasp the reality of a Christ-less existence. At Christmas I now more fully realize and experience the joy of a better understanding of the impact of Jesus' birth upon the world; an overwhelming joy to see how his existence as Lord of Lords moves us all toward the ultimate deliverance from despair: the return of Jesus Christ as the Ruler and King of all creation. As we wait here in the darkness of Advent, we have hope. The hope is Jesus Christ...the true light of the world.

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## Coming this January: In Case You Were Wondering...

Some of you have had questions about the worship service at First Baptist Regina. The structure, the hymns, the repetition – they drive some of us crazy while others really enjoy and appreciate them. Actually, our services weren't always quite as structured as they are at present.

### Dial-the-Sermon – (306) 992-1912





## Tithes and Offerings

Whether you are attending Sunday services in person or online, there are several methods that you can use to give your tithes and donations to the church:

1. Mail your gifts to the church or call and leave a message at (306) 359-1450 to arrange for an in-person pick-up. Please place your cheque in your regular offering envelope (or any envelope marked "Offering"), and seal that inside another envelope addressed to: First Baptist Church, 2241 Victoria Ave, Regina, SK S4P 0S4.
2. Establish a **Pre-authorized Remittance (PAR) Plan**. This will automatically transfer funds from your account into the FBC Regina account on a regular basis. Please email the church or contact the Treasurer if you would like to set up PAR, or change your commitment.
3. Make an [online donation](#):
  - Use a credit or debit card to make a donation from our website. (*The church is charged a small processing fee for each donation.*)
  - Use **Interac e-Transfer** to donate from your phone or computer to FBCRegina@gmail.com (*no fee or cost to the church*)
  - Use a credit card with a PayPal account via the **PayPal Giving Fund** (*no fee or cost to the church – 100% of your donation reaches us*)
  - Use a credit card or PayPal via **CanadaHelps** (*a 3.5% fee is deducted from the donation*)
  - Use a credit or debit card via **FBC ChurchTrac** (*the church is charged a fee of approximately 3% for each donation*)
