 Questions: Merv Hepting: regarding the refugee family, do we know the status of their needs? Joel explained the bank account and how it will be used once the existing family and their needs are covered.

8. 2023 Budget

- a. Personal/property/admin have gone up a bit, but other line items have remained largely consistent for expenses
 - i. Questions: Laureen Snook: does personal line item include music minister? Yes, but it is not so straightforward. The line item represents what it costs to run the things that we currently run. It is trying to be flexible.
- b. Income reflects what we have been running for the previous years. Chaplaincy services simply reflects what FBP pays us.
- c. \$1K a month for rentals (KLC/CCF)
- d. Youth Centre gets a line item on the missions budget
 - i. Questions: Derrick Bellows: aside from operating donations, are the rest of the income line items stable? Yes. Rosemary Ward: what are the grounds for expecting an extra \$50K in donations? Ron Philips answer: difficult decision and predicated on 2 different things: operating donations and actuals from the end of last year. Rosemary replies: what is the process, looking at the average donations and extrapolate that through the months, donations MOM are down, it is not unreasonable to anticipate still less even in December 2022. *Kevin Rich*: should we forecast a deficit budget? *Rosemary*: does the budget take into account the December bump? Kevin: yes it does, we bring in roughly 13 months, but we can't forecast 3X giving in December. Good news/bad news, we have a healthy bank account and investments, no external debt either. It is a good time to make a mistake, this year. Bryan Orthner: at budget meeting, should we budget for a deficit? Plan for it or just let it happen. Overall feelings were to plan for the balanced budget, and is aspirational, but not overly aspirational. This is presenting a balanced budget. Kevin

replies: this is the number we need, but there are challenges we are seeing.

- e. Budget is a "best guess" for 2023
- f. Expenses have been slightly increased, and our utilities have gone up, and insurance as gone up
- g. Loan payments will continue at \$1K
- h. Transfers to capital fund at \$5K/year
 - i. Questions: *Tracy Sailor*: can we increase rental rates to cover raise in utilities? *Joel R-M* replies: short answer is yes. However, YFC is based on older assessment of fair market rental rates, and right now might not be the best time to revisit that (rentals in downtown are going down).
 - ii. Laureen Snook: loan to ourselves, was that original re-payment commitment \$1K changed? Kevin Rich: we have moved it from \$2.5K/month to \$1K, interest rate remains the same
 - iii. *Derrick Bellows*: we dug ourselves out of the hole for bond redemptions and line of credit. His memory is that it has never been a problem, we have always come in around budget. Decrease expenses, etc. He likes the budget, we can afford a bit of a deficit. He supports the budget.
 - iv. *Carmen Orthner*: are there discussions of YFC leaving? *Joel R-M*: no. We have committed to doing some projects and we are good with them.
 - v. Len Pauls: we give them a donation back, though. Do they count on that donation remaining static, so that their effective rent is lower? Kevin Rich: if we start reducing that, they would start looking at something else. In order to help them stay, they are counting on that. They are paying about \$25K/year in rent.
 - vi. *Rob Stafford*: no projects planned for 2023 for the church. *Kevin Rich*: we are still going to build up the capital fund
 - vii. Joel R-M: observation about missions budget, most of the local funds being given is going to the lunch program but a bulk is going to the CBM. 20% of our income is going to others.
 - viii.MOTION: Kevin Rich, seconded: Bryan Orthner CARRIED

Board Chair Report

2022 was a year of emerging out of covid, and of rebuilding. Pastor Joel helped us think this through theologically and practically by taking us through Ezra and Nehemiah this fall, so that we might learn from the Hebrew people's experience of returning from exile. The world we have emerged into is not the same as the world we once knew, and rebuilding our life and ministries is a challenge. One of the hardest things is that not everyone has returned with us. At the same time, we know God's faithfulness and his presence in this place and time. And it is so good to be back at Time for Friends and at meals together, and doing in person ministry.

Your church board continually wrestles with the issues facing our church. both large and small. We read a book together, Plunging into the Kingdom Way, by Tim Dickau, who pastored Grandview Calvary Baptist Church in Vancouver for many years. This helped us wrestle with our own particular challenges and opportunities here in Regina.

We saw more pastoral staff changes in 2022. While a sub-committee worked hard at finding a full time music person, this did not work out. However, Louise Krueger stepped up and has been leading our music ministry since late summer. We are so grateful for her. And we did find just the right person to lead our children and families' ministries - Cheryl Johnston! Cheryl began her ministry in late August and has fit in wonderfully. Kayely is now doing more administration and pastoral care, after having led us so well during Joel's sabbatical. But it is so good to have Joel and his family back home, leading and caring for us. And of course Chris Senger continues to lead our youth. We have a strong and cohesive pastoral staff. They have also picked up the chaplaincy responsibilities at First Baptist Place, since Norma's retirement after so many years of faithful and fruitful ministry.

I'm thankful too for Esther Gurnsey, who leads our communications efforts.

A significant ministry investment this year has been the weekly Saturday lunches, where, with the help of churches around the city, we provide food and a warm space for people in our city who need such. And we have also invested time and

energy on the issue of refugees, though the Syrian family we had hoped to welcome continues to be stuck in a refugee camp in Lebanon. We are also looking at sending another team to visit our partners in Lebanon. These efforts, I think, reflect our church's heart, a heart for our city and for our world. Still, the board wrestles with how to be a faithful gospel witness in our time and place.

I wish to thank Barry Lyons and Tiffany Stafford-Lai for their faithful work on the board these past six years. They have now completed their terms. Others carry on: Brenda Ziolkowski, Adijah Pusi, Kevin Rich, Derrick Bellows, Heather Russell-Maclean, and Roger Bellows.

I am grateful too, for the many people who do all the things that make a church function. You are noticed and appreciated. And I'm grateful for every single person, young and old, who enriches us all simply by being who they are. You are loved. We are a family.

I leave the board now, after almost seven years, the last three as chair, with a sense of gratitude for the privilege of serving the people of First Baptist Church. We are a flawed and imperfect group (me above all!), but a people nonetheless whom Jesus delights in, and delights to use to build his kingdom.

Treasurer Report

First Baptist Church is active in a great many ministries, and follows the CRA standards for charities in reporting and tracking our finances. In addition to financing the normal day-to-day activities necessary for our church life (operating expenses), we have a number of restricted reserves that are dedicated to specific purposes.

The FBC community was very conscientious in maintaining a healthy giving effort in 2022, although our general offerings decreased by 4% over the previous year. Thanks to extraordinary December giving, our overall revenue again exceeded our yearly expenses, which provided us with a surplus and an excellent beginning to 2023.

We continue to make monthly payments against both principle and interest for the internal loan from our own Organ Fund. This loan was supplemented with the CEBA interest-free loan, a program provided by the government for COVID relief. We plan to pay back CEBA loan by the end of 2023, and the Organ Fund loan is expected to be paid off in 2045 at our current rate.

Detailed financial information follows in the audited statements, but highlights are presented below.

Operations

Church staff and leadership manage the operating expenses of the various operations and ministries. Personnel accounted for 53% of the operating expense in 2022. Property, Administration and Missions also had significant budgets. The church staff and leadership continue to carefully monitor all expenses.

Restricted Reserves

Separate Restricted Reserve fund accounts were established in 2017 for special long-term financial items. Expenses and revenue related to these funds were managed separately from the operating budget.

The <u>Building Fund</u> is for larger capital expenses related to building repair. During 2022 we had several larger projects that were funded. This fund had just over \$2,225 at year-end.

The <u>Organ Fund</u> is for expenses related to the maintenance and use of the pipe organ. This fund has had significant donations through estate bequests over the years. In 2020, the Organ Fund provided the church with a loan of \$215,000,

which we used to pay off the CBWC loan. This allowed the church to reduce the interest paid on debt from 5.65% to 2%. As a result, the church has no external debt. The fund account had a total of about \$77,400 at year-end, with a current loan balance owed to the fund of about \$173,700.

The <u>Benevolent Fund</u> is for special financial aid to individuals and families. It is administered by the pastoral staff with accountability to the Board. This is part of our approved budget and donations are requested when the fund is low. During 2022, this fund provided over \$4,000 in support. This fund had \$546 at year-end.

The <u>Legacy Fund</u> was created a number of years ago to hold funds to support special outreach projects from our church that were not part of the annual budget. The main source of money to this fund is intended to be from estates and special gifts. The fund had \$17,169 at year-end.

We have also initiated a <u>Refugee Fund</u> to assist in the financial support of refugees in their first full year in Canada. We have a current balance of \$1,184 in the fund, however no assistance to refugee families has yet been provided.

General

About 12% of our revenue came from property use, not donations. The largest is the facility agreement with Regina Youth for Christ who pay market value rent of the Youth Center. We do return about 38% of that rent as part of our missions support to their ministry. We also received payments from the Christ's Commission Fellowship for the use of the sanctuary for services.

Through 2022, Shelly Pippin CPA Prof. Corp. continued to provide bookkeeping services. We are very appreciative of the work and assistance that Shelly and Jenn are providing. The Finance Committee continued with the same membership of Marv Fuller, Gloria Toews and Tom Chen, who assisted me in ensuring that our financials were properly managed through the year. I thank them for their commitment over the past year. I also thank the Board and staff for their diligence in managing the financial resources entrusted to them.

This was my fifth year as Treasurer, and I thank you, the family of First Baptist, who continue to provide the finances for the work of our church.

Lead Pastor Report

Last year, in his report, our board chair expressed our desire to remain in step with the Spirit. We therefore moved forward with careful and prayerful attention to what matters with a readiness for the unforeseeable.

Attention to what matters meant trying a few new ideas while caring diligently for what we already have in fellowship, care, discipleship, and mission.

The unforeseeable came as well. Louise and Cheryl both applied to join our staff out of our congregation. We have a front pew full of children once again. We were blessed by the baptism of a young man and his powerful testimony.

It was also a heavy year of losses. We said farewell for now to a number of long time members and good friends.

On a more personal note, the wind of the Spirit blew me and my family across the UK and France while on Sabbatical. I enjoyed reading "The City of God" while passing through many different kinds of cities, attending church on Sunday and during the week. It was an unexpected blessing to discover, in so many places, resilient congregations and monasteries, freely and clearly sharing the Good News. My family and I are so grateful to the congregation for the gift of this leave.

Renewing Our Ministries

We returned cautiously to ever larger gatherings Sunday morning and at concerts and then to meals together, first outdoors on Willow Island, then in our lower hall. We renewed our commitment to make regular visits to shut-ins with a full pastoral staff and fewer restrictions in care homes. We held a fall retreat at our camp.

We also maintained our online connections. People continued to join bible studies, worship services, and meetings online through Covid's ongoing activity and a big return in the fall of colds and respiratory viruses. Others have been relieved to be able to take part online where, previously, winter storms, dangerously icy commutes, and age-related mobility challenges would have meant missing out entirely. We will continue to invest in this area of ministry. Thank you so much to over a dozen volunteers who make this possible, week after week.

Local Outreach

All last year, Louise Krueger and Barb Ziolkowski helped an ecumenical committee organize free lunches from the lower hall in partnership with other churches. 18 different churches are now taking turns. We have received calls and notes of thanks from these churches because it is such a joyful time. Coming alongside those who are hungry or homeless can be contentious and divisive, as we have seen in our city council, the Legislature, and across the country. While we pray for those in government, we are grateful for the unity we have experienced as The Church working together.

Music

We continued to navigate an epochal transition in our music ministry following the retirement of Rev John Nelson, Pastor Emeritus. He has continued to support our congregation and staff in prayer, in leading, and friendship.

The music search committee put in hours of work seeking a permanent replacement and came to the point of inviting a candidate which in the end, did not work out.

Instead of what we planned, Dr Melissa Morgan helped to lead us in music through January on top her duties as a U of R professor. We were then blessed to have Maria Fuller offer to step into the role for a few months during a break in her conducting contracts. She composed a number of choral pieces for us and prepared a beautiful and challenging Easter concert. Maria continues to conduct a number of symphonies and operas across Canada.

Through the summer months, a variety of musicians and volunteer song leaders stepped forward from among our own ranks. We tested our own strengths in this area and found much to be grateful for. Thank you to everyone who helped out.

Over the summer, Louise Krueger approached us and asked to be considered for the role of temporary choir director. She then dived in, selecting choir anthems for the entire year, finding an accompanist, and drawing up drafts of the Christmas and Easter concerts. She quickly put her stamp on the choir and led a lovely Christmas concert.

Many Hands Make Light Work

Thank you to Chris Senger, Norma Holtslander, and Esther Gurnsey for faithfulness and hard work this past year. Thanks to Ron Phillips, in his final year as board chair, to Tiffany Stafford-Lai and Barry Lyons after their six years of service, to Rob Stafford, who helps before and after most events and oversees the care of our building, and to Kevin Rich our Treasurer.

A warm welcome to Louise Krueger and Cheryl Johnston. You have both stepped into your role with great skill, love for people and attention to the details.

A special thank you to Kayely Rich for stepping into the role of interim Lead Pastor during my sabbatical. She led pastoral care well, especially during the passing of two of our long term members. She completely oversaw the addition to our staff of Louise Krueger and Cheryl Johnston. She managed weekly affairs with such ability and grace.

Finally, thank you to everyone at our church for continuing to pray and care for one another. Thank you for the opportunity to serve you for another year.

The Spirit is still leading, generation after generation. The new challenges may seem daunting but perhaps that makes the unexpected gifts all the more precious.

In September, I returned to my role as Associate Pastor, with a change in duties. You could now describe my key duties as pastoral care, teaching, spiritual formation and administrative leadership. It is a pleasure to continue to serve this congregation with this staff team.

First Baptist Place Chaplaincy Report

We are so grateful for the very caring and capable leadership of Rev Norma Holtslander over the last decade as Chaplain at First Baptist Place (FBP). Before her retirement from the role at the end of November, Norma coordinated the Wednesday evening chapel service, offered pastoral care to individuals living at First Baptist Place and, broadly speaking, sought to help the building tenants navigate the realities of covid together.

Norma also regularly attended staff meetings at our church. Her insights and friendship with others were much appreciated. This was of particular note during Joel's Sabbatical when Norma went the extra mile to support both Esther and Kayely in their roles.

Following Norma's retirement, Joel and Kayely, in consultation with the FBP board, agreed to share the leadership of the Wednesday evening chapel service at FBP for the time being by leading on alternate weeks. Seeking to incorporate tenants who come from a variety of Christian denominations, we continue to have a time of singing, a Scripture reading, short reflection and prayer time each week. We are currently using the lectionary's Gospel reading to give shape to our times together. We are grateful to have several pianists who live at FBP that we can call on to accompany our singing times each week.

Missions Commission Report

Commission Members: Bryan Orthner (chair), Barb Ziolkowski, Carmen Pauls Orthner, Heather Russell-MacLean. Pastoral liaison: Joel Russell-MacLean.

Our mandate:

- Provide vision, direction and management for our "missions" ministry, including: financial, relational and practical involvement in missions
- local AND global involvement in missions

In 2022, the Missions Commission budget financially supported YFC (\$15,684), Katepwa Lake Camp (\$6,000), IVCF (\$3,000), and the local inter-church Saturday feeding program (\$1810). In addition, the Commission budget provided \$10,500 for our church partnership with Canadian Baptist Ministries in Lebabon. 2022 started with a missions focus, as our first service of the year included having Lebanon missionaries speak remotely with Joe Bridi and Eli Haddad both speaking, as well as having our Lebanon staff's children read the scriptures for the service.

In May, the church held a meeting to discuss ways to assist the Syrian refugee family which FBC is formally sponsoring with the support of a local group of families.

The Missions Commission hosted a Lebanon dinner at Bryan and Carmen Orthner's home in August as the kick-off for our annual Lebabon fundraiser. By the close of the fundraiser in November, the people of the church had contributed \$12,650 above our budgeted commitment towards the support of our Lebanon partnership.

In the fall, we were also able to hear from the Russell-MacLean family about their summer travels in Europe, including their experiences with churches in England, Scotland, and France. We hosted a meeting with Rachelle Low and Maryann Gibson. A number of FBC people came out to meet Maryann and to hear about her new role as the part-time staff worker with IVCF at the University of Regina. In late November, we also hosted a meeting with Dennis Shierman, our CBM Western Canada Regional Representative, who talked to us about the ministries of CBM around the world and in Lebanon.

Looking forward to 2023, we hope once more to promote the Lebanon partnership through our annual fundraiser, as well as support a SENT team return to Lebanon. We continue to anticipate the arrival of our Syrian refugee family and hope that this will open doors for FBC people to minister the love of Christ to this family.

Property Report

We have completed a number of jobs both in the church and the Youth for Christ centre, from updating a number of the offices and re-flooring and painting the Youth Centre. With the increase in costs, it has been a trying year but we got through this with the help of a few people donating their time and skills. A big thank you to Marvin and Len for their wonderful work on the sound board and Marvin's continued work around the church. It is great to see the church getting back to normal again with Time for Friends, Learning for Life and other church groups using the church. We have a busy year ahead as we will be hosting concerts and Open Door's child drop-in-centre once again. We are always looking for help around the church with minor repairs and with the property operations so if you think you could help talk to either myself or Joel.

This winter has been difficult for everyone with large amounts of snow and colder temperatures. We have seen an increase in snow removal. To manage costs, we are working with a start-up company and are ironing out issues as they learn.

We have a few ongoing projects that we are working on, including lighting, AV upgrade, lower hall floor and chair repair. We had investigated the repointing and repair to the brick work on the exterior of the church on the east, west and south sides to prevent water damage to the walls and ceiling, the dome inspection was carried out and after a minor leak over the stage was found we (Marvin) was able to carry out repairs to prevent ceiling damage.

We hope to carry out painting projects around the church over the next three years, but we feel there are a number of other projects that should be carried out before we start these.

Youth Group Report

Our Youth program and ministry had a year that was defined by the challenges of what it means to "emerge from Covid" and attempt to evaluate what is worth preserving and what is worth reevaluating as a ministry. Last June, we began to meet fully face to face, and while we had a summer with no programming, we kicked things off with a BBQ in the fall. While there has been a good energy and excitement about meeting together again, there is also a noticeable change in the needs that our youth have, and how our ministry and community attempts to meet those needs.

Right now, I can identify two significant changes or progressing changes in what we are doing as a youth ministry: First, we are alternating weekly meetings between Wednesdays (bible study and food) and Fridays (youth event). Second, we are trying to re-establish some of the collaborative ministry opportunities, or local based partnerships, that exist in Regina. This was a strong component of our ministry pre-Covid. An example of this is our recent joint Youth Event with Our Saviour's youth group, and our conversation around joining "Merge" which is an initiative to have multiple churches meet on a regular basis for youth activities, events, and ministry gatherings. To some extent, this is about remembering what was good and helpful before, and considering how we build relationships again that re-establish those patterns and priorities in a way that also recognizes that there has been significant change. An example of this is how we are attempting to establish relationships with churches, and youth groups, but there are now new pastors or leaders in place. So, not only are we navigating how to build those partnerships again (or find new ones, such as with Our Saviour's), but also developing new relationships.

Re-establishing communication has also been a major focal point this past fall, and one that needs significant improvement. The realities of Covid created a pattern where it was more difficult to do long range planning. This has bled over into how we/I have communicated events on more of a week-to-week basis. The hope and goal is to create patterns of communication where we communicate well in advance what youth events are, and what parents can expect, without the worry that those will need to be cancelled or changed due to outside regulations or changes in Covid policies.

I am grateful to be part of a team at FBC where people continue to prioritize the importance of meeting people's needs, while also encouraging them to grow in their faith. Please pray that the Spirit will lead us and shape us, and that we will better understand how to meet the needs of our youth while also encouraging them, and supporting them, in their faith journey that calls them to be the transformed into the Image of Christ in this world.

Children's Ministries Report

What an exciting year for children's ministries at First! The year started off with Sunday morning kids programming that was reminiscent of a one-room school. Children of all ages were together in one class as children and volunteer attendance were still impacted by pandemic realities. Gradually we began to offer 2 classes: Godly play for the younger kids and a simple Bible reading + art time for the older kids since we lacked the numbers required to restart Oasis at this point. We had volunteers periodically for nursery. Then as winter turned to spring, we enjoyed a growing number of kids and volunteers taking part.

This growth in volunteer numbers came just in time as Pastor Kayely prepared to step into the role of Interim Lead Pastor during Joel's sabbatical and couldn't be downstairs with the kids as often. Many thanks to the volunteers who ensured the children's ministry continued to flourish throughout the spring and summer!

We were excited to offer the first summer kids program since covid started throughout July & August. A big thank you to Jennifer Holtslander who took on the role of coordinating lessons and leaders as the kids spent Sunday mornings studying the books of the Bible. It was a special treat to have members of the congregation come and share their favourite Bible stories or passages with the kids.

In September, Cheryl Johnston began as the Children & Family Pastor. We started the Fall with a training session for all children's volunteers to review safety and protocol expectations. Later, Jennifer Holtslander led a Godly Play training session to teach the volunteers the how to facilitate a godly play lesson, explaining the philosophy and the format.

We have had three ministries happening during Sunday morning services:

Nursery is for ages newborn up to 3 years. This has had one volunteer weekly. There have been 1-2 babies most weeks.

Godly Play is for ages 2.5-6 years. It has had 2 to 6 children each week. This is based on a Montessori method of learning Bible stories and liturgy. The Biblical stories follow the church calendar and the children are led through the story with "wonder questions" (ex. I wonder how it felt when God led the Israelites through the water to freedom?). A Leader and a Shepherd walk the children through the lesson, snack and response activities. We are so grateful for a team of about 8 people who serve in Godly Play one week a month.

Pastor Cheryl has been teaching the Oasis group (grade 1 to 6) throughout the Fall with a different helper each week. We have been grateful for these helpers who share their gifts with the children as we learn about the Bible stories through activities based on "multiple intelligences". We read the passage from the Bible then we do activities such as drama, art, music, games, cooking and science. We focus on one Bible passage each month. The children often say the lessons are fun and are able to retell the stories well after spending 3-4 weeks with the same passage of scripture. We have been working to incorporate some Bible memorization.

Approximately once a month the children are upstairs with the adults so they can be involved in the service and be part of our wider congregation. Generally, the children sit at the front with activities to do based on the sermon topic. Sometimes the children help by reading scripture, leading the prayers and bringing forward some of our worship elements (ex. cup and bread for communion, the large Bible or the light for the Pachal Candle). We also had fun

acting out the story of Ezra/Nehemiah in place of the sermon one week in October.

During Advent, a calendar was created with activities, songs and Bible readings that focused on the meaning of Christmas. Families were invited to post the calendars in their home and do the activities as they were able.

We have now seen our numbers in the children's program return to pre-pandemic levels. We give thanks to God for faithfulness to our families and look forward to God's continuing work in their lives.

We are so grateful for the people who have volunteered in our children's programs, especially during the uncertainties of the last few years. If you are interested in helping with any of our programs, please contact Pastor Cheryl. We could use a few more helpers.
